Politics is fun and this year's campaign has been a humdinger since the Morse-McKay battle reached a local level. However, we're just a little weary (and so is a lot of the public) of the debate issue that has drifted off onto tangent after tangent.

From where we sit, it looks as if there just "ain't gonna be no debate." It would have been interesting even to those who take a dim view of politics, no matter what the subject or the whereases and whereifs involved.

The Journal, which is editorially supporting Douglas McKay for U. S. Senator, cannot blame one party or the other for the situation that has developed. Three challengers made their offer in good faith and sincerity, and all facts available are that Sen. Morse accepted the challenge on the spur of the moment without consulting better informed advisors than he about political philosophies. That was bad judgment on the part of the Senator.

The acceptance was received through an Ontario newsman, who had previously publicly proclaimed himself a strong Democrat. After one or more of several denials had floated across eastern Oregon, a member of the county Democratic Central committee was credited with "cinching it down" about a debate to be held in Malheur county with Sen. Morse here in person.

When enough time elapsed for some logical consideration on the part of the Morse staff and a few local supporters who showed somewhat better political judgment an attempt was made to undo an untidy situation in which the organization as a whole found itself.

The challenges and counter-challenges along with charges and counter-charges are too numerous for us to follow.

But it's gonna be awful dull after Nov. 6.
