SENATOR MORSE--AND MORE FACTS

While the political party Morse may have abandoned is of no significance, nevertheless his previous views on desertion of one's party reflects Morse's lack of political character or principle.

Here is Morse the Republican talking before the young Republican convention at Salem on 12-4-48:

"I am particularly critical of those SO-CALLED LIBERALS, in the Republican Party who in times past have accepted high office from the Republican Party, have enjoyed the benefits that the party gives them through their offices, have accepted committee assignments in the Congress of the United States from the Republican Party and THEN HAVE SULKED in their tents during a campaign."

"IN FACT SOMETIMES SOME OF THEM HAVE EVEN GONE SO FAR AS TO BOLT THEIR PARTY BECAUSE THEIR PARTY HAS NOT ACCEPTED IN TOTO THEIR VIEWS ON EVERY SUBJECT."

Morse thought so much of his own words that he had them inserted in the Congressional Record Appendix, pages A-159 to A-162.

On October 30, 1946, Morse wrote a letter to Judge Robert W. Sawyer, editor and publisher of The Bend Bulletin part of which is as follows:

"Many of the so-called liberal Republicans have shown themselves to be political prima donnas with the result that they have no great influence within the party itself."

"I recognize that it is important that liberal Republicans hold their support among independent voters, but I am convinced that the independent voters, once they stop to think about it, will have much more respect for a liberal Republican who is loyal to his party convictions at election time than they would have if he adopted renegade and bolting tactics at election time — which is too frequently the case among liberals."

On June 26, 1946 he issued this as part of a press statement:

"I am always surprised when the suggestion is made that if I should not find myself in complete agreement with whoever the Republican party nominates in 1948 I should bolt the party."

"Such a suggestion cannot be reconciled with my conception of political ethics and loyalty to the liberal cause. I am no quitter."

Now let us see how these high sounding principles were put into action by Senator Morse.

Prior to the 1952 convention he wrote Fred Haas, publisher of the North Bend News, North Bend, Oregon (1-24-52) as follows:

"I have seen Eisenhower under cross-examination in executive sessions of our committee on a great many occasions. I know him to be a very intelligent man with complete intellectual honesty and a marked impartiality. I have never seen him duck or hedge an issue or misrepresent a fact. I would be the first to admit that he would not move as fast in the field of domestic policy as you or I would probably like to have him, but he would be impartial and fair and we would have a good chance of obtaining action on the merits of the issues presented to him."

"I am for Eisenhower because I think his election will give the people of this country something they sorely need, and that is a rallying point for any renewed faith in the future and destiny of our country."

Here's what he wrote to General Eisenhower before election:

"It is unimportant that I disagree with you on certain specific issues, because as to those issues, only time will tell what is the correct solution. What is important is that our people have as President a man such as you, in whom they can place their complete confidence and know that you will exercise an honest independence of judgment on the merits of each issue."

On October 19, 1952, Morse deserted General Eisenhower and the Republican party and made accusations against the presidential candidate.

From that point on here is what Morse had to say about President Eisenhower:

"Senator Morse added that he feared the election of General Eisenhower would greatly increase the chances of a third world war." (New York Times, 10-25-52).

NOTE: President Eisenhower's efforts for peace have proven Morse wrong again as usual.

"... Eisenhower reached a new low in political campaigning when he stopped in demagogic fashion to raising false hopes in the hearts of the mothers and fathers of the boys in Korea by leaving them with the impression that if he were elected President, he would bring American boys from Korea and train South Koreans to fight against Communist Asiatics." (New York Post, 10-26-52).

NOTE: President Eisenhower did just that and history has proven Morse wrong again as usual.

"I have absolutely no confidence in him and I am satisfied he is completely lacking in all political morality."

"In my judgment, he is the most dangerous man who will ever have been in the White House."

(Sen. Morse, New Republic Magazine, 3-2-53).

NOTE: The American people and the world at large know that Morse was wrong again as usual.

"... the Eisenhower administration is leading America into a 'form of economic fascism' and President Eisenhower is personally responsible."

"I think the responsibility for the maladministration of this country rests squarely on the shoulders of the President himself." (Oregon Statesman 8-26-55).

NOTE: The Idaho Statesman commented editorially:

"That is an alarming statement for any United States Senator to make about a President, a stupid statement for any person to make about our present economic conditions. MORSE MUST BE SUFFERING FROM SOME KIND OF SHOCK."

BELIEVE IT OR NOT — QUOTATIONS BY MORSE

"I am no longer a Republican, but there is a great difference between my position and joining the Democrats in the Senate. HOW COULD I FOLLOW THE REACTIONARY LEADERSHIP OF DEMOCRATIC LEADER JOHNSON OF TEXAS?" (Morse in Detroit News, 1-23-54).

"Senator Wayne Morse, Independent of Oregon, said this week that a report that he planned to enroll as a Democrat this fall was 'A LIE BEING SPREAD BY MY ENEMIES.'" (New York Times, 7-18-54).

It is difficult to characterize the above attitudes of Senator Morse in the light of other U. S. Senators since history does not disclose anyone holding high office who had so little regard for political integrity. It appears that as the whim strikes him, Senator Morse will change his principles as quickly and as often as his political party. His remark about SO-CALLED LIBERALS who have "GONE SO FAR AS TO BOLT THEIR PARTY BECAUSE THEIR PARTY HAS NOT ACCEPTED IN TOTO THEIR VIEWS ON EVERY SUBJECT" Seems tailored for himself yet it didn't bother him to cast aside this principle.

How can one understand our Senator when in early 1952 he wrote about President Eisenhower that "What is important is that our people have as President a man such as you, in whom they can place their complete confidence and know that you will exercise an honest independence of judgment on the merits of each issue" and on March 2, 1953 he said: "I have absolutely no confidence in him and I am satisfied he is completely lacking in all political morality. In my judgment, he is the most dangerous man who will ever have been in the White House." On March 2, 1953 President Eisenhower had been in office merely 42 days, yet this did not deter Morse from calling him the most dangerous man ever in the White House. Such talk from a U. S. Senator degrades the high standing of the United States Senate and such switch from benevolent love of the President to vitriolic hate in so short a span, degrades the individual who holds the office of United States Senator. That the man guilty of such unbecoming conduct should be the Senator from Oregon is an insult to our state. The 100,000 Democrats, Republicans and Independents who stood in the rain in Portland, last week to view our President indicated completely whether they agreed with Morse's denunciations of President Eisenhower.

If we would re-elect President Eisenhower, to vote for Morse would be like hiring a building contractor and then employing a wrecker to follow behind him tearing down his work. The people of Oregon cannot afford such a mistake.

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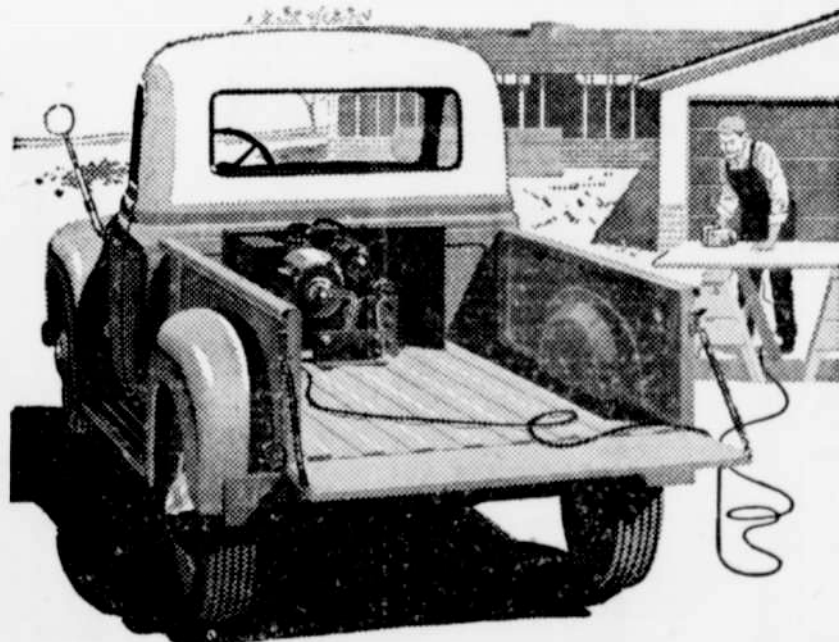
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
