Not having been present at the game your reporter cannot take the "I was there" approach, but when pheasant hunters FROM John Day claim Nyssa was "robbed," one cannot help but make a few comments.

Here's a couple of items to chew over.

A John Day player was tackled — was on his knees and players from both teams walked away — at which time the downed man tossed a lateral to a teammate which was good for a 40 yard romp. On another play the Bulldogs recovered a fumble. AFTER the play was whistled dead a referee threw down a handkerchief and penalized the Nyssa eleven. More? On a pass play the Nyssa receiver was completely smothered — but good, but no interference was called.

Both teams scored six touchdowns with the extra point making the difference. Counting for Nyssa were Talbot (2), Messick, Pond, Sanders and Rinehart.

Dennis Savage, Bulldog spark-plug, was injured early in the second quarter, suffering a mild concussion. He was reported OK at pretime.

Services for Mrs. Theresa Marie Beranek, 76 who died Sunday at the Holy Rosary Hospital in Ontario were conducted today at 9 a. m. from the St. Hubert's parish with Father Rembert Ahles officiating.

Mrs. Beranek was born Sept. 6, 1880 in Czechoslovakia and has lived in this country 61 years. She has lived in Eastern Oregon since 1915. Her husband, Carl Beranek preceded her in death in 1941.

Prior to 1945 when Mrs. Beranek came to Nyssa to live with her daughters, Mrs. C. M. Tensen and Mrs. Clayton Jensen, she resided in Baker county. In April, 1951 she was entered in the hospital in Ontario where she lived until her death.

She is survived by five daughters, Mrs. Marie Johnson, Pekin, Ill., Mrs. Emma Lindsey, Whitebird, Ida., Mrs. Johanna Smith, Klamath Falls, Mrs. Ann Tensen and Mrs. Katherine Jensen, both of Nyssa, one son, Carl Bernack, Westwood, Calif., eighteen grandchildren and fifteen great grandchildren.

Resitation of the rosary was held Wednesday at 8 p.m. at the Lienkaemper chapel. Interment was in the Nyssa cemetery.

1950 and second in 1951. In 1952 he was named vice-principal and dean of boys at La Grande.

Jack came to Nyssa in August of 1954 as principal of the high school, his present job.

In the meantime he had received his masters at the University of Oregon, working for that degree during summers.

He met his wife, Roberta Sutton, a Weiser girl at La Grande where she was teaching. They were married November 3, 1951. As has been the case in all interviews for this column, it took some thinking to come up with the date.

The Jenkins have two children, Jeffrey, born January 28, 1954 at La Grande and Charles who arrived September 30 last year here in Nyssa.

Jack doesn't belong to too many civic organizations. He is a member of the Lions club but he's also an "unofficial" member of countless organizations in the school and at the beck and call of the PTA.

Asked if his was an eight hour a day job, Jack replied, "not by a long shot," a fact of which most parents are well aware.

Jack concluded by stating that Nyssa is fortunate in having a school system that has grown with the community. He praised the cooperation of the parents, students and taxpayers in molding an educational institution that rates so high in the state.

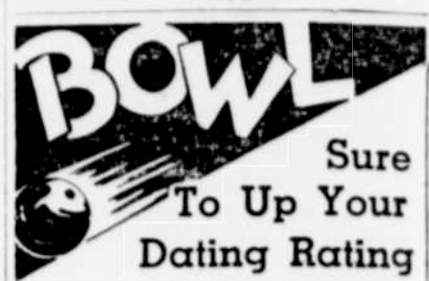
