SEN. MORSE VS. REPRESENTATIVE GOV'T

ARTICLE 13

In the previous 12 articles we have tried to present to the free thinking voter, whether Democrat, Independent or Republican a word picture of Senator Morse as disclosed by his record. We have confined our remarks to quotations from the Congressional Record and other official sources in order to avoid any resemblance to the wild statements and double talk of politicians.

We hope that our readers are now satisfied that Senator Morse's defeat is important, not to determine a contest between two candidates for the U. S. Senate, but to remove as the Senator from Oregon a man who by his opportunism and lack of political integrity, has failed to uphold the honor and dignity of Oregon. Everyone should be convinced that Morse has been ineffective as our Senator. Even he admitted it when he said: "I AM NOT VERY GOOD AT INFLUENCE" (WITH HIS FELLOW SENATORS), (7-2-52 Cong. Record, p. 883) and "WELL, I GOT 31. THAT IS PRETTY GOOD FOR ME. WHEN I GET 31 VOTES IN THE SENATE ON SOMETHING, I HAVE HAD A HEYDAY . . ." (Judiciary Committee 5-16-56). His record of success on legislation during his career in the Senate is less than 10% (analysis of Morse Legislative Record, American University, Washington, D. C.).

How has he continued so long as our Senator? The answer is simple. The voters actually knew very little about their Senator other than that he is intellectual, an excellent speaker, and personable when seeking votes. However, that is not enough.

For those who need more evidence the following two compelling reasons, alone, should satisfy anyone that Morse is not deserving re-election.

MORSE DENUNCIATION OF PRESIDENT EISENHOWER:

"I have absolutely no confidence in him (Eisenhower) and I am satisfied he is completely lacking in all political morality. In my judgment, he is the most dangerous man who will ever have been in the White House." (Morse New Republic Magazine, 3-2-53).

MORSE DISREGARD OF OREGON VOTERS

"If I were satisfied that every man and woman in the State of Oregon wanted me to vote for this bill, I would still vote against it. . . ." (Morse quotation by Robert Ruark, Oregonian, 5-7-53).

No one need defend the integrity, sincerity or political morality of President Eisenhower. The people will answer Senator Morse on November 6th.

But no thinking voter can condone Morse's views on disregarding the will of the people he is supposed to represent. Such thinking is the worst violation of the principles of representative government under which our American system has become so great. The people vote to elect their senators by majority rule. Thereafter it is the obligation and duty of the elected official to respect the wishes of the people he represents and if every man and woman in Oregon wanted Morse, or any other representative, to vote for or against a bill, that elected official is obligated by the sacred trust imposed in him to respect the wishes of the people. We hope that those who would forget or disregard the peoples' wishes shall always be quickly rid of their high office, regardless of political faith.

The stakes in this election are high. The battle is not of Douglas McKay against Wayne Morse. It is the dignity of the State of Oregon against Morse. DON'T FORGET THAT MORSE'S DEFEAT WILL NOT BE A VICTORY OVER THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY BUT A VICTORY FOR THE STATE OF OREGON. YOUR VOTE FOR DOUGLAS MCKAY WILL BE A VOTE FOR OREGON.
