have "sat out," but we had an obligation and caucused to find some workable program. We came up with a proposal for a 30 percent surtax, which is all a matter of record," Holmes said.

He stated that when the bill finally came out, the Republicans had lowered the exemptions which are unfair to larger families. The Democratic minority wanted to raise corporation taxes, but the majority members engineered the changes because of the Democratic proposal for the surtax, Holmes charged. The legislature came up with the 45 percent surtax bill with a sales tax in its minority report. "We (the Democratic senators) took the lesser of two evils and voted against the sales tax," the candidate stated.

Need Tax Money
Holmes acknowledged that without the surtax and sales tax, the state will have to have another source of income. The interim committee has made no report yet, but it probably will recommend a sales tax with a so-called balanced plan like California, the candidate predicted. "Powerful forces are trying to drive us down the road to a sales tax," he charged, and added that the people are unhappy with the surtax. Holmes described various sales tax proposals as "sugar-coated" with numerous exemptions to make each segment of Oregonians think each Republican proposal is the one for them.

The speaker re-emphasized several times that the state must have more money and said the ultimate route is two different tax sources. Again referring to a sales tax, Holmes termed the Portland chamber of commerce as the "ball-carriers" for a sales tax, which he asserted, is a means of pushing the tax down to lower income groups based on the ability to spend and not the ability to pay.

Aside from legislative proposals, the candidate said that more tourists should stay longer in Oregon. They now pay taxes on food and lodging, but Oregon spends \$300,000 a year on advertising, yet it is one of the lowest tourist-per-day states, he said and added, "They treat us like a corridor."

Income Tax
If the income tax law is revised Oregon can raise enough money, but a system of withholding taxes from all wage-earners instead of the 2 percent deduction is needed, Holmes said.

The state senator emphasized that he is opposed to ballot measure No. 1 which would prevent the people from stopping collection of unwanted taxes, such as a sales tax, for a period of from 18 to 22 months following passage of a tax bill with an emergency clause by the legislature. "Approval of this measure to change the constitution would be final blow and allow a sales tax to be passed and collected against the wishes of the people," Holmes said.

During the questions and answers period, the candidate stated that the unemployment compensation law was made worse by the last legislature. On federal aid to education, Holmes said the

people must face up to the problem of the increased birthrate and that "we can no longer look to the local level for finances, but must have some federal support." He advocated federal aid without federal control and called attention to a proposal by the late U. S. Sen. Bob Taft to have federal funds intermingled with state money and distributed on each state's formula. Oregon would receive \$20 million more annually and "we would get back some of the money we spend for income taxes," he said.

Sources Unknown

Interviewed by the Journal following the meeting, Sen. Holmes was asked if he had figures on the amount of money that might be raised from a corporation tax and increased income taxes. He stated that no estimated amounts are available, but acknowledged that \$60,000,000 additional funds were sought during the last session of the legislature.

When asked if that might not be greatly increased during the 1957 session, Holmes said he believed so. He stated that full 50 percent support for schools could not be accomplished in one or even two bienniums, but that it would have to be done gradually.

He also agreed that income taxes might have to go much higher than they are now to pay for the increased needs. The candidate expressed the opinion that demands will increase and that it is reasonably certain that taxes won't be reduced.

The state senator told The Journal reporter in answer to a question that reports of "business being driven from Oregon by the high surtax" are grossly exaggerated, and acknowledged that "the people's dislike" for the tax is not general throughout the state.

Rather than stand on a street corner and watch all the girls go by, Bill returned for post graduate work at Washington high, taking six courses in math and two in chemistry—something very

few present day students do on purpose, let alone accidentally.

In December of '32 Bill went to work for Charles Lilly Seed Company in Portland where he worked as an order clerk. In 1935 he was "loaned" to Gooding, Idaho to assist the seed company there and returned to Portland where he was foreman of the cleaning plant until the fall of 1936.

He took a fling at boat building and repair in 1937 but returned to the grain business in the fall, going to work for the Deschutes Grain and Feed company at Redmond.

In September of 1939 Bill was associated with a new company at Merrill, Oregon where he was supervisor of the cleaning plant. He stayed on the job until February 1944 at which time he received a wire from Nyssa and with his wife's complete and enthusiastic blessing he accepted the position of manager of the cleaning operation at Dessert Seed. He has served as secretary of the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Seed association, was a second vice president and is now first vice president of that organization.

Bill's hobbies include hunting, fishing, woodworking and, when there's time, golf.
