Fiction, true sea stories, child management, biography and drama are included in the group of books going into circulation on Saturday, Nov. 3, at the Malheur county library.

"The Road to Glory" by Darwin Teilhet is a novel of early California about a young adventurer whose materialistic aims are altered by love and by the saintly influence of Father Junipero Serra.

"The Last Squadron" by Gerd Gaiser is a story of a week in the lives of a group of German pilots who realize near the end of World War II that they are fighting for a lost cause.

"Freedom or Death" is a novel by Nikos Kazantzakes about the revolt of the Cretans in 1889 against their Turkish oppressors.

"The Long Watch" by Elizabeth Linington concerns the beginning of a free press in America at the time of the Revolutionary war in New York City.

"Sea Fights and Shipwrecks" by Hanson Baldwin narrates true tales of mutiny, mystery, wreck and battle from 1816 to 1945.

"The Early Years of Childhood" by Catherine Stern and Toni Gould is subtitled "Education Through Insight" and sets forth a middle road between authoritarian attitude and too great freedom.
