

Grange Master Gives Warning About More Tax

Grange Master George Cleaver told members of Oregon Trail Grange Thursday night that if the state tax commission revalues farm land, taxes will go much higher and will cost Malheur county approximately \$150,000.

Other activities on the program included a talk by Mrs. Garrett Stam on the situation in the Middle East and a general discussion on Booster night when 4-H awards will be given by the county leader and a potluck dinner.

The Grange master appointed Mrs. Garrett Stam, Frank Parr and O. E. Cheldelin as a committee to organize a Red Cross drive. It was pointed out that the Oregon Trail goal is \$350 and that if blood had to be purchased because of loss of the blood bank, it would cost \$35 or more a pint.

The group discussed measures to be voted on the ballot at Tuesday's general election.
