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Henry R. Fields Dies at Hospital

Henry R. Fields, well known resident of Nyssa, died in the Malheur Memorial hospital Friday at the age of 81.

Mr. Fields was born Sept. 25, 1875 at Sweet Home, Ore., and moved to Nyssa about 1899. Shortly after coming to Nyssa he served as city marshal. Upon leaving that office Mr. Fields worked in the sheep business, then later returned to official business as a deputy sheriff. About 1905 he operated a saloon in Nyssa, but closed it due to the prohibition. He then opened up a garage and was interested in the trucking business, but returned to the tavern business which he maintained until retiring several years ago.

He married Ellen Pierce of Nyssa in December of 1904.

Survivors in addition to his wife include a daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Blodgett of Nyssa, a son, Robert Fields of California and three brothers.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Lienkaemper chapel with Bishop Mann of Parma officiating. Interment was in the Nyssa cemetery under the direction of the Elks Lodge.
