5 Years Ago—Nov. 15, 1951

The Adrian football team, which played eight games with Snake River valley B league teams without a loss, has been denied the right to play for the Oregon district 8 championship because of failure to meet other Oregon teams. . . . The state sanitary department has urged the city of Nyssa to place its sewage disposal plant back in operation. As a result the city is ordering necessary parts at an estimated cost of \$2000.

COUNTY LIBRARY

Natural history, lighthouses, rifles, Christian knowledge and cookery are non-fiction subjects that together with fiction titles are among the books going into circulation on Saturday, Nov. 17, at Malheur county library.

"Nature's Wonders in Full Color," edited and compiled by Charles Sherman, was prepared in cooperation with the Audubon society to interest the general reader in the fascinations of nature study.

"Famous Lighthouses of America" by Edward Snow contains some unique stories and dramatic experiences of American lighthouse keepers.

"Editor's Choice" is a collection of 26 modern short stories from Good Housekeeping magazine.

"Position Unknown" by Ian Mackersy tells a story of incredible hardships undergone by survivors of an airliner's crash landing in the New Zealand wilderness.

"Falconer's Voyage" is a World War II story by Hugh Hickling of British naval officers who took part in the Normandy invasion of 1944, and of one in particular for whom this voyage was his salvation.

"The Royal Anne Tree" by Patricia Campbell is set in Washington territory before the Civil war and tells the story of an orphan girl married to a miserly middle-aged widower.

"At the Edge of the Shadow" by Elizabeth Rodewald is a novel concerning a 40-year-old woman whose marriage is disintegrating and who finds herself on the brink of alcoholism.

"From Flintlock to M1" by Joseph Shields traces the historical development of the rifle.

"The Honey Cookbook" by Juliette Elkon contains recipes for the use of this sweet in relishes, cereals, puddings, candies, punches and sherbets.

"Foundations of Christian Knowledge" by Georgia Harkness examines authority in Christian belief, the relation of theology to

The Nyssa Broom factory opened for operations Monday by Charles Stowell. Three men are employed and they expect to turn out 16 dozen brooms per day. Mr. Stowell raised the broom corn on his farm near Nyssa. . . . A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sheets (editor of the Journal) in Vale Nov. 11 at 11 a.m. and weighed 11 pounds.

Corn Growers Are Members Of New Club

A 150 Bushel corn club has been set up for Oregon farmers participating in the yield contest of the state corn show, according to R. E. Fore, show chairman.

He said that growers who have produced 150 or more bushels to the acre in past and future yield contests will automatically become members of the organization. Up to the present time 12 local corn producers have qualified.

Malheur county members of the 150 bushel club include Robert Reffett, Walter Dillon, and T. H. Brewer of Nyssa; Art Neeley and Frank Syrovatka of Vale; Harry Holbrook, W. J. Cech, and Harold Amidon of Ontario; John Thiel of Adrian; Curtis Bunich of Pavette; and Dudley Sittin of Willowcreek. Robert Reffett holds the county record of 187 bushels per acre grown in 1949.

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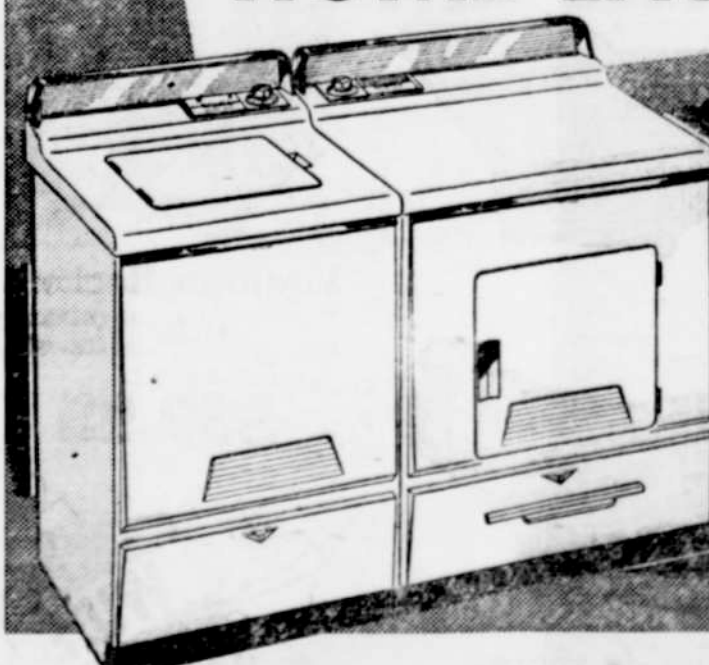
