Elza Niccum of Cow Hollow harvested six gallons of English walnuts from his 10-year-old tree, believed to be the only one in eastern Oregon.

10 Years Ago—Nov. 21, 1946

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Burkey, high school and first grade teachers, have resigned to enter private business. . . . Jerry Knottlingham of Boise has started trenching for the water main project for the city of Nyssa. . . . The sugar industry was the theme at a dinner given by the Nyssa chamber of commerce. Outstanding contribution made by the Amalgamated Sugar Co. to the Nyssa-Nampa area was emphasized at the meeting which included members of the Associated Chambers of Western Idaho and Eastern Oregon.

4-H Leaders To Plan Program

Leaders and girls planning to join a 4-H clothing club in the Willowcreek community will meet Wednesday, Dec. 5, in the Willowcreek school at 4 p.m. immediately after school.

Hints on Livestock

4-H beef club members will want to get their calves started right away. Not only should these calves be started on feed but they should begin getting their education, particularly leading. It is much easier to break a 400 pound calf to lead than it is a 600 or 700 pound steer; he'll remember it longer, too.

One of the easiest ways to start halter breaking a calf is to keep it tied up for several days as soon as you get him. Carry his feed and water to him so that he'll begin to look forward to your visits. After the first several days, brush

him on the back and sides; he'll start gentling down for you.

The first time you try leading the calf, get your father or someone to help because if the calf ever gets away from you he'll get the habit and will always be looking for the chance. For this lesson, use a long rope. Stay close to the calf with your helper out on the end. This way the calf thinks you're the one who's doing all the holding.

For calves particularly hard to break to lead, here's a trick that works well nearly every time. Take an old inner tube, tie one end solidly to a post and one end to the lead rope. The harder the calf pulls back, the harder the tube stretches. Pretty quick the calf takes a step forward and finds that the pull isn't so great. Gradually he finds that if he doesn't pull back at all there is no tension on his nose band. It won't be long until the calf stays right on your heels when you lead him because he knows that it's no use to pull back.

One thing to always remember: don't treat your calf mean. Build his trust in you. It's a great feeling when your calf starts enjoying your company.
