Sub Teachers Must Have Proper Certification

All school districts in Malheur county must use properly certified teaching personnel when it becomes necessary to employ a substitute teacher for a regular faculty member, it was stressed today in a letter from the county school superintendent to school clerks and school board directors.

In so far as possible, each district must comply with the law. This means a teaching certificate and health card showing the substitute to be free from tuberculosis which must be registered with the county superintendent. Anyone wishing to do substitute teaching should contact the county office for information as to proper procedure. Minimum salaries are established by law and apply to substitute teachers: less than a bachelor's degree, \$16.67 per day; bachelor's degree, \$18.33; master's degree, \$20.

The office will appreciate having as many teachers as possible register for substitute work. The State Department of Education will issue certificates good for 90 days to those individuals who desire to do substitute work if they have certain educational qualifications. A health card showing the teacher to be free from tuberculosis must also be registered with the county office.

If a school district must employ a person who cannot obtain a teaching certificate, the district board should insist that the substitute have a health certificate. The office recently discovered an active case of tuberculosis in a regular faculty member which shows rather pointedly why health certificates are required, Supt. William Leggett said.

Christmas Seals Available in Nyssa

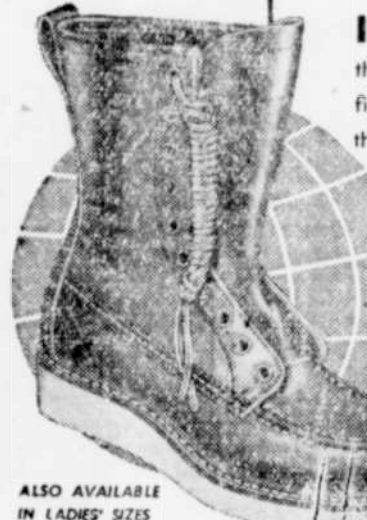
