Harold Kurtz Goes Into Inner Africa

Harold Kurtz wrote his parents of his trip into the wilds of Ethiopia, leaving Oct. 29 and returning Nov. 17 traveling 30 miles by foot in 17 hours without food as they only planned to be gone about 14 days. Due to having difficulty in finding guides who knew the trail, they were gone 21 days. Wild meat was plentiful, but the rest of the food gave out.

The company consisted of three white men, an interpreter, three muleteers, three soldiers and one cook and later added two more soldiers, and four natives to help as guides. Harold's first problem was getting used to riding mules as they are small and you "step on them" instead of swinging.

After finally being guided by another guide, (all the others had quit) they found the crossing to the Omo River. This valley is the game country of Ethiopia. They saw an African Buffalo, a herd of Antelope, waterbucks, hyenas, monkeys and crocodiles.

They met a man who said he could guide them across the river and to the mountain. Only part of the group could cross in the 18-foot dugout. The rest waited for their return, which took three days. When they arrived at the river two hippos were lying in the middle of the river keeping cool.

The people seem to live mostly from the river which is about three fourths as large as the Snake River but crocodile infested.

Their last day in camp he reported that when the men returned to cross the river the boat was gone. Harold tied three air mattresses together and paddled across, hauling men and equipment in three trips. The only worry was crocodiles. A man stood on each side of the river with a gun keeping watch, but they gave no trouble.
