The next meeting will be Jan. 14 at the home of Mrs. Harold Wilson.

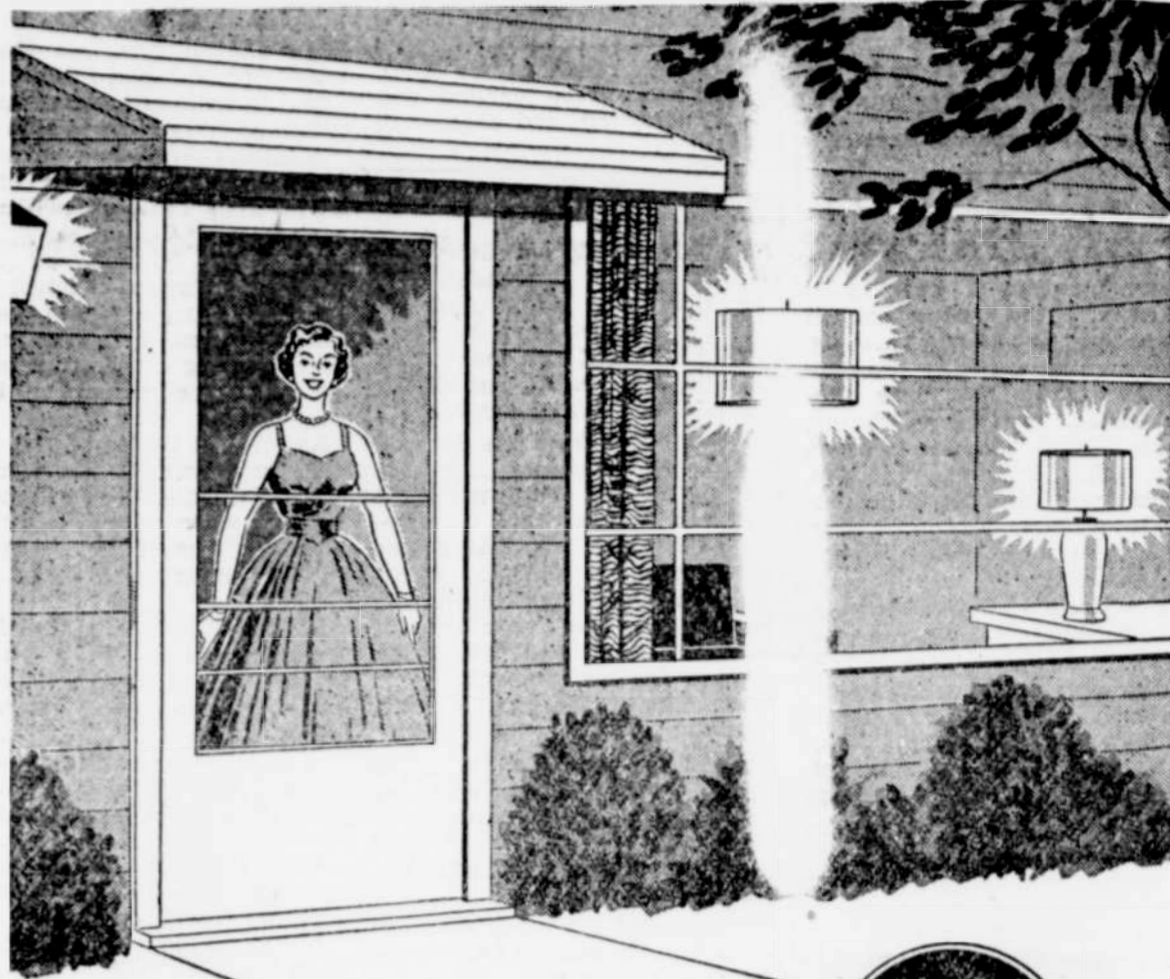
Attend Golden Anniversary Fete
