

Izaak Waltons Will Seek Funds For Owyhee Road

Efforts to raise approximately \$4,000 through donations in Malheur county and adjacent communities to build a road from Owyhee dam to Gordon Gulch was proposed Monday night at a meeting of the Izaak Walton League in Ontario. The sportsmen's group will attempt to raise the funds through other organizations, rather than by direct solicitation on the part of league members.

The proposed road would be "just a trail" for jeeps and fishing cars and is expected to lead to federal and state development proposed at a meeting in Nyssa Dec. 28. The Izaak Waltons have proposed that the name "Lake Owyhee" should immediately be adopted to replace what has been known as Owyhee reservoir.

Members having charge of contacting organizations in the various communities are Wayne Garner, president of the league, Nyssa; Bob Webster, Adrian; R. W. Jones, Ontario, and George Van Horn, Vale.

At Monday night's meeting, it was also decided to forward recommendations of the state game commission to have an earlier hunting season in dry land areas for chukar and Hungarian partridges and for mountain quail. It was explained that if the season is opened prior to that for Chinese pheasants, partridges and quail would not become scattered as they are now.

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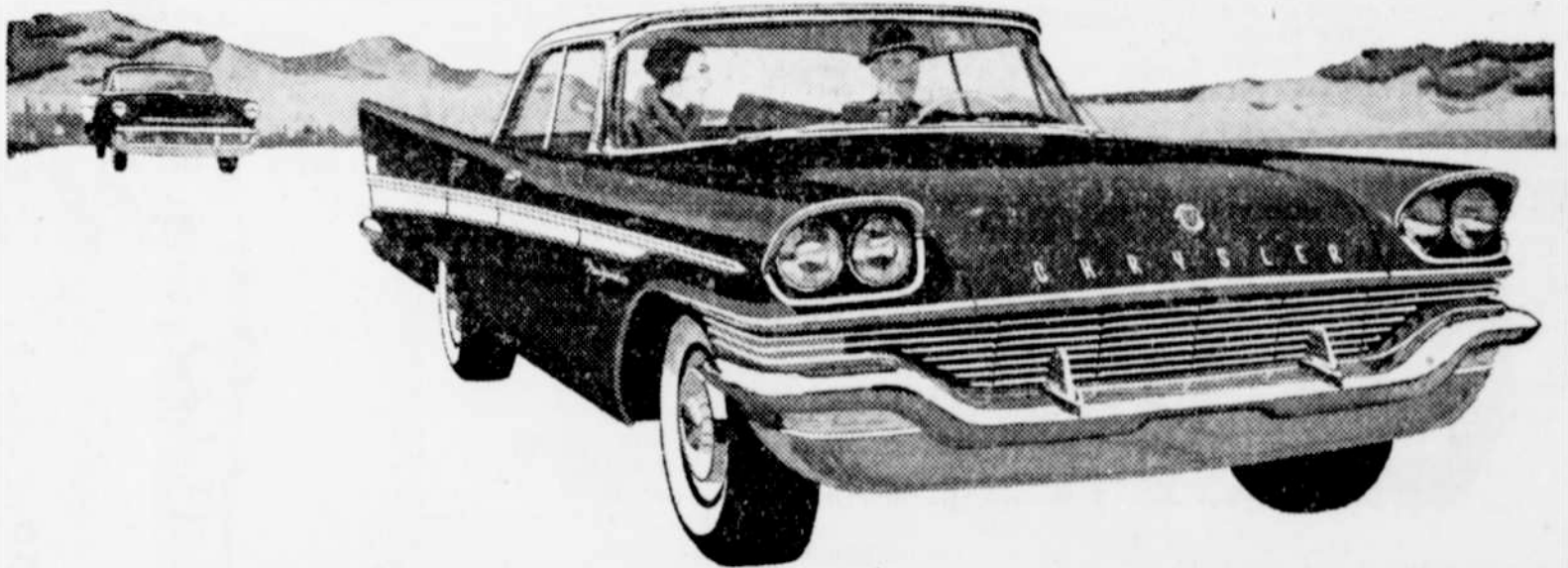
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
