Youth Workshop Set February 9 For Legislature

High school boys and girls in eastern Oregon will participate next month in the tenth Oregon YMCA youth and government program. The Nyssa Hi-Y club will be among the groups taking part in this year's program.

The first step in the program will be a pre-legislative workshop to be held February 9 in Baker. The program will include a discussion of bill-drafting, parliamentary procedures, legislative techniques, and a panel discussion of needs affecting the welfare of the people of Oregon.

High school young people from YMCA, Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y clubs of Milton-Freewater, Hermiston, Pendleton, LaGrande, Baker and Nyssa will take part in the February meeting, following which each local Hi-Y club will begin drafting of a bill. The clubs will elect youth senators and representatives who will represent them in an Oregon YMCA state youth legislature to be held in Salem later in the year.

Charles W. Steffens, Nyssa high school faculty member, is adult advisor to the local Hi-Y club.

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Kurtz' Receive News From Son

The last letter received by the M. L. Kurtz family from their son, Harold in Ethiopia, tells of their trip to Addis Ababa where they attended an association meeting composed of the missionaries and their families, which includes doctors, nurses, ministers and educational directors from the United Presbyterian church who are serving in Ethiopia.

The Kurtz family and one nurse planned to travel from the mission compound in Maji by mules, with native boys to help them but they were refused traveling papers if they went by mule. Instead, they were offered the use of a police truck and a driver to bring the jeep back.

In order to catch the plane they had to leave the afternoon before so they took tents along to use as shelter for the night. There wasn't room for the food box so they had to leave it for the police man to bring. Their evening meal consisted of over-ripe bananas, roasted peanuts and cheese, but the children were having more fun than they had at home.

When they left Maji the truck was in such bad shape that they had little hope of it ever reaching the airstrip. The first part of the journey was extremely rough and they were all mighty glad to finally reach their destination.

Harold wrote, "We had a wonderful Christmas—will tell you about it later. We are being delayed in Addis due to work on the jeep truck. I will be driving back to Maji, while the family flies back, possibly the 7th of February."

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Local Alfalfa Seed Growers Meet; Help Raise Funds For Entomologist

Local alfalfa seed growers met in Adrian last Thursday and took steps to have a jointly financed entomologist placed in the area to study pollination and insect control problems, according to Delbert Garner, Sunset Valley area alfalfa seed grower. About 100 seed growers, dealers and beekeepers attended the meeting.

The meeting grew out of a request of local seed growers to Oregon State college for assistance in studying, protecting and increasing alfalfa bee colonies. These insects are the chief pollinators of alfalfa seed in the area. The OSC experiment station agreed to place an entomologist in the area if growers were interested enough to finance half the project for the first year. The cost of the project is \$3,000, and growers must raise \$1,500.

Seed raisers at the meeting voted a voluntary assessment of 50¢ per acre of alfalfa seed to finance the entomologist. About \$1,300 in cash and pledges were made by growers, seed dealers and beekeepers. Seed men present at the meeting are urged to send their contribution to the Malheur Legume Seed Growers' association, care of treasurer Vern Garner, route 2, Nyssa.

Dr. W. P. Stephens, bee specialist at OSC, discussed seed production with the group. He pointed out that other seed growing areas have started out with high yields which tapered off because proper protection was not given pollinators. He cited alfalfa bees as responsible for the high seed yields in the Adrian area and stressed the need for protecting them for continued high production.

Stephens listed protection from insecticides, protection from parasites, and the moving of alfalfa colonies as leading problems. Transplanting alfalfa bee colonies is difficult as they nest in damp, compact black alkali soils and resist moving. Establishment of new colonies calls for the study of site development and special means of getting bees established in new locations.

Parasites which kill the young bees were found in all colonies visited by Stephens last summer. In some instances as high as 93 percent of the young bees were killed. Research has not been developed to control these enemies.

The indiscriminate use of insecticides was pointed out as having taken a terrific toll of alfalfa bees in some areas.

Seed growers at the meeting felt that a scientific study of these factors by a qualified entomologist may pay big dividends in continued high alfalfa seed yields.
