Mrs. Harry McGinley and Mrs. Rudy Marostica were co-chairmen in charge of arrangements.

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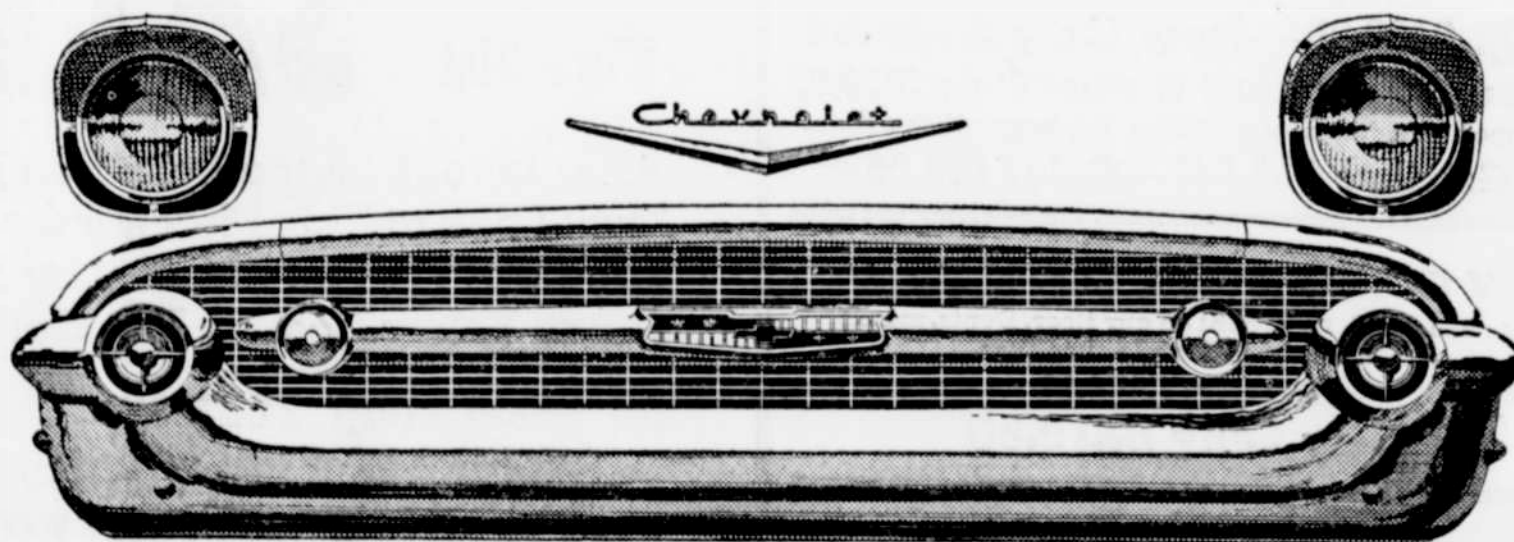
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
