24 of 32 State Corn Show Winners In District Are Malheur Growers

Corn is grown in Malheur county as indicated by the state corn show held in Ontario in December, 1956. District one includes all corn growing areas east of the Cascade range. Thirty-two farmers had over 100 bushels yields per acre. Twenty-four of these were from Malheur county. The top yield was 191.5 bushels, grown by C. J. Cooper of Stanfield. Cooper used Dekalb 409 and fertilized with N-115, P205-0-K-0, on alfalfa ground. He irrigated this crop three times. Here are some of our local growers and their results:

John Reflett, Nyssa—544-N-150, P205-52, K20-O, on corn ground; yield, 160.7 bushels.

Ward Lundy, Nyssa—KT6-N-60, P205-84, K20-O, on alfalfa ground with yield of 157.8 bushels.

Wayne Garner, Nyssa—KT6 on corn ground with a yield of 155.3 bushels.

John Lackey, Nyssa—544-N-80, P205-O, K20-O, on sugar beet ground with yield of 147.5 bushels.

Robert Meisenger, Nyssa—KT6, N-100, P205-O, K20-O, on clover ground; yield, 147.5 bushels.

LeRoy Custer, Ontario—Dekalb, N-120, P205-O, K20-O, on pasture ground; yield, 162.6 bushels.

Stanley Sisson, Nyssa—544-N-100, P205-O, K20-O, manure 10 tons, on corn ground with a yield of 158.8 bushels.

Larry Hickman, Nyssa—544-N-O, P205-O, K20-O, manure 4 tons, on alfalfa ground with yield of 132.6.

Ray VanderOord, Nyssa—Dekalb 409-N-120, P205-O, K20-O, on pasture ground with yield of 130.5.

The quality displays were also in competition. Ray Heinze, Canby, had the best 10-ear exhibit in the show. In our district, Ward C.
