NEWS FROM H. KURTZ

A recent letter from Harold Kurtz tells that perhaps plane service will be increased to one plane a week into Maji.

The Kurtz' were still in Addis Ababa. Harold expected to leave on the 21st with a stop at Jimma where they can purchase supplies.

Another stop in Ghimera to do necessary repairs on the jeep truck he was driving loaded with furniture, supplies and plumbing supplies they will be using to make their native house more modern. At present they have decided not to build but will cover the dirt floor with a cement one and enlarge one bed room besides other improvements. One native man accompanied Harold on the trip which is expected to take two weeks.

Polly and the children will fly in the first part of February after Harold arrives so he can meet them at the airstrip. If the mission board does not approve of delaying the building of the proposed new house then this native house will be used as a guest house. If plane service continues on a monthly basis more people will be visiting this mission station.

Harold has been the mission repairman this month of vacation along with performing a wedding and helping in various meetings. The missionaries enjoy many gatherings as do families here with birthdays, anniversaries and the departure of personnel on furloughs giving them an excuse for a party or dinner.

A social hour and refreshments were enjoyed by the group.

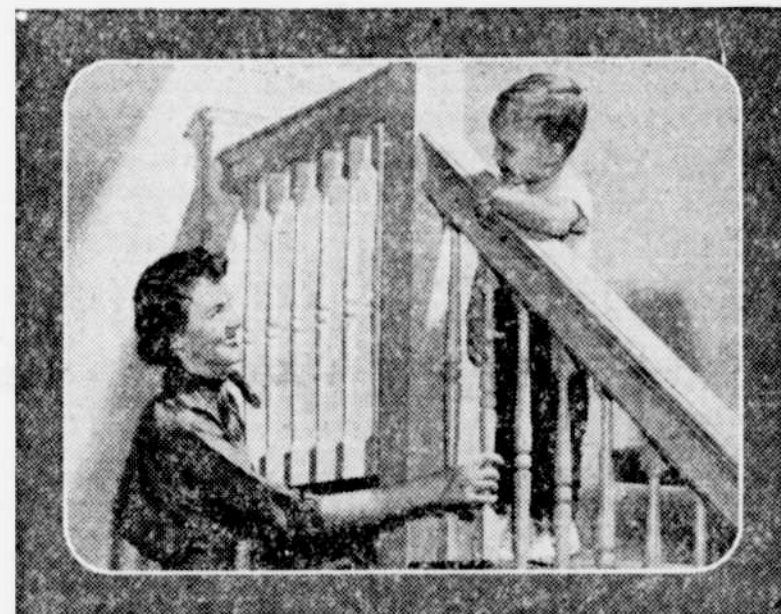
