We have had questions from time to time concerning the International Farm Youth Exchange program, and we will attempt to answer some of them here.

The I.F.Y.E. program is a project for young people between the ages of 20 and 30 from farms in the United States to live and work with farm families in other countries to come here and observe rural life in America.

The program helps to promote world peace by developing understanding and appreciation of problems and by making friends among people. While delegates learn about agriculture and science in their host country, what they learn in this respect is important only as it helps them to understand the "way of life" of others.

The I.F.Y.E. program is financed by voluntary contributions. The National 4-H Foundation helps pay the bills. The Oregon Bankers association has for several years sponsored two Oregon I. F. Y. E.'s. Other organizations who help are 4-H and other extension groups, farm, fraternal, civic and church organizations, and individuals.




