Nyssa Nipped By John Day In Final Tilt

The Nyssa Bulldogs lost a heartbreaker in the last 15 seconds to John Day in the A-2 playoffs Saturday night on the local floor when the visitors moved in front to win the vital game 56 to 53.

The Bulldogs for three quarters played one of the finest games seen on a local court only to make costly mistakes when it seemed they had the game "in the bag."

A 10-point third quarter lead melted away giving John Day the dubious honor of meeting Madras (19-0) in the playoffs. Madras is ranked the number one team in the state but Coach Stan Olson, who has seen Madras in action said that the Bulldogs, if they played the type of game that they played the first three quarters Friday night against John Day could have given the champs a real ball game.

Deer Herd Data Tallied By State

Although mild weather which kept the animals widely scattered hampered this year's study, game biologists have completed their annual herd composition inventories to determine sex and age ratios of Oregon's deer herds.

In their travels through the big game ranges, biologists observed more than 18,000 animals which were classified as to sex and age. Of this number 2,896 were bucks, 9,140 were does, and 5,974 were fawns. Another several thousand animals were observed but went unclassified because identification was not possible.

Herd composition on most ranges showed a slight increase in the buck-toe ratio and a slight decrease in the fawn-toe ratio. On a state-wide basis, blacktail deer west of the Cascades stood at 32 bucks per 100 does and 57 fawns per 100 does. Mule deer herds in eastern Oregon were 32 bucks and 67 fawns per 100 does. The 1956 composition counts stood at 31 bucks and 66 fawns per 100 does on the west side, while 29 bucks and 80 does were tallied for eastern Oregon.

On several of the more critical ranges, measures of herd composition indicated low farm production. This was especially shown in Grant county where classification of almost 800 animals on the Northside range indicated a ratio of 39 fawns per 100 does. Last year's production stood at 62 fawns. Murderers creek also had poor fawn production with only 33 compared to 62 last year as did the south for John Day with 35 compared to 57 in 1956. The low fawn production in these critical areas can be traceable to the poor condition of the does last spring.

On most of the better deer ranges, fawn production was on a par or above the production of 1956. The Waterman range had 90 fawns per 100 does, Umatilla 93, Heppner 93, and Lookout mountain 103.

Game agents report that so far this year mild weather has favored deer, and they still remain widely dispersed and at higher than normal elevations. Food also has been available in quantity and quality, and deer are going into the critical part of the winter with a good reserve of fat. Barring severe winter conditions the next two months, herds should pull through in fine shape with only a minimum of winter loss.

Natural Gas Due Within Three Weeks

pipe to Amalgamated Sugar which is converting to the new fuel. While the company will lay pipes to the houses and business establishments, patrons are reminded that they must install black iron pipe of adequate size to carry the low pressure gas. This can be done through local plumbing establishments, which the company

prefers, or, should it be necessary the concern will suggest to patrons ways in which the work may be done. The new headquarters of the Eastern Oregon Natural Gas company is located in the old post office building where appliances, furnished by local merchants, are on display.

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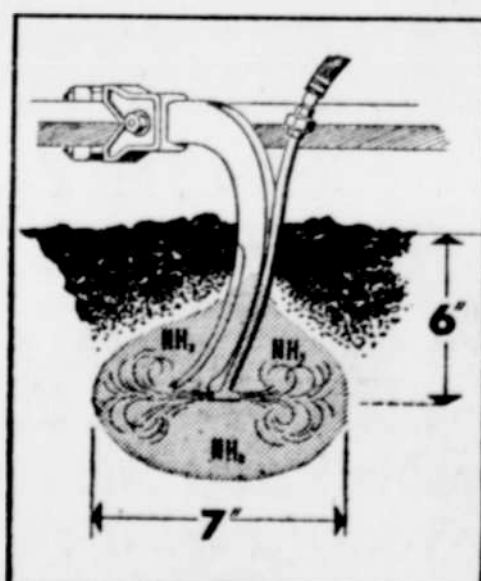
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Facts on Nitrogen Fertilizing



Pressure Applications

Anhydrous ammonia (NH₃) injected into the soil under pressure spreads out laterally from the shank. The NH₃ forms a tear-shaped pattern.
