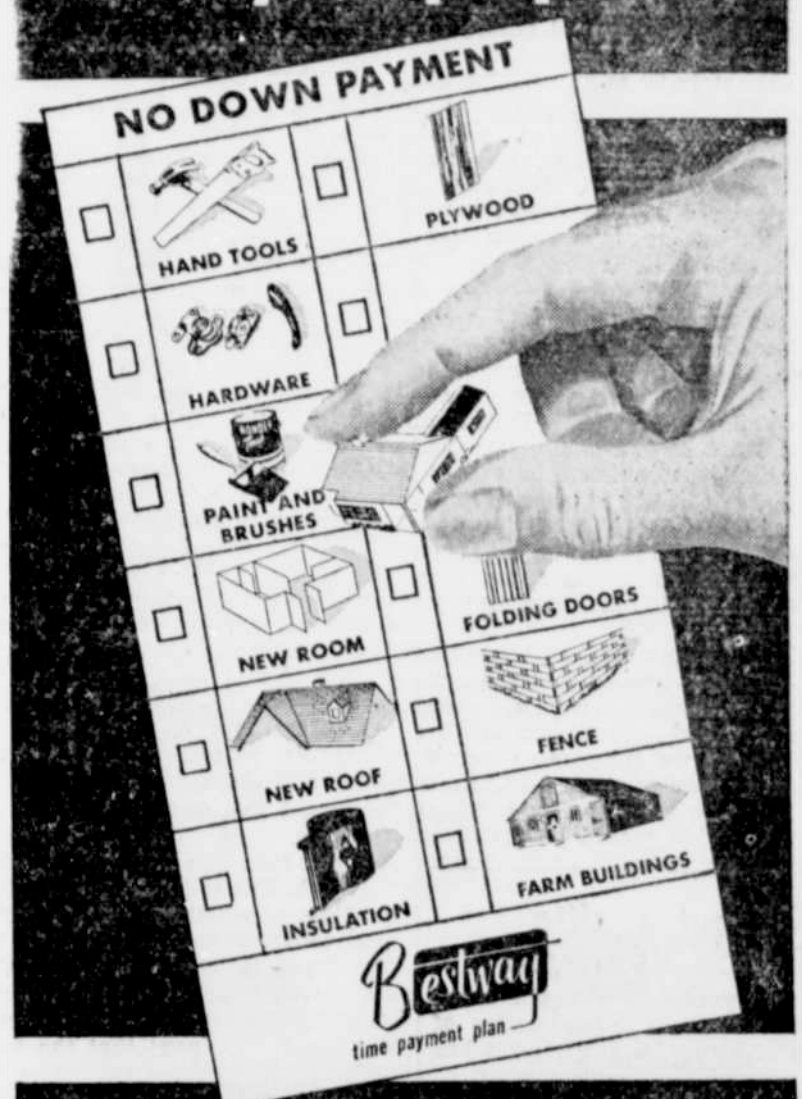
Parish Plans Lenten Services

Inquire and convert classes are scheduled to begin March 13 at the rectory.

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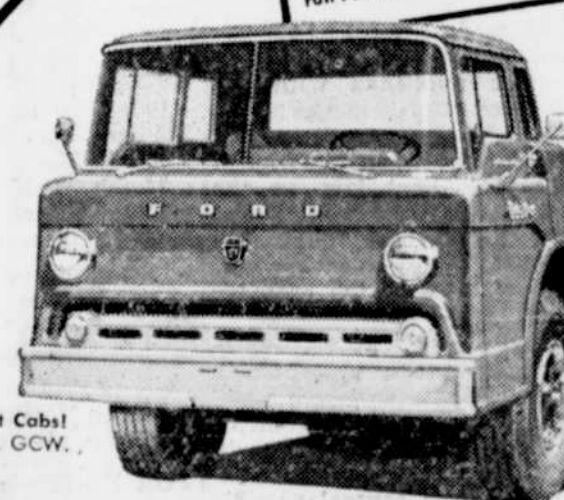


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
