COUNTY LIBRARY

A wide selection including non-fiction both thought-provoking and interesting, and historical and light fiction went into circulation Saturday, March 9, at Malheur county library.

"Africa's Challenge to America" by Chester Bowles, former American ambassador to India who travelled recently in Africa, analyzes the state of upheaval there, suggests a constructive U.S. policy to win Africa's friendship and points out the West's stake in Africa.

"The Man Who Lived Twice" by Eric Barnes is the life story of Edward Sheldon, a playwright who was struck down by a virulent form of arthritis, yet lived triumphantly in spite of being paralyzed and blind for over 20 years.

"The Octagonal Heart" is an autobiographical account by Ariadne Thompson recalling her St. Louis childhood in a spacious octagonal house where her Greek and American heritages mingled. "O Beulah Land" by Mary Lee Settle is a novel of the pre-revolutionary war period when colonists of the Virginia wilderness struggled against the French and Indians and labored to break land and create homes.

"Know Your Camera" by Alfred Wagg covers selection of the camera, types of cameras suitable for different kinds of pictures, use of accessories and darkroom procedures. Photographs exemplify the author's principles.

"Treasury of American Gardens" by James Fitch and Frederick Rockwell shows a panorama of gardens, old and modern, large and small (including photographs in color) and a view of what is happening in the landscaping of the American home.

"Alps and Elephants" by Gavin DeBeer is a reconstruction of the route Hannibal took across the Alps.

"A Surfeit of Honey" by Russell Lynes is characterized as "a friendly, if somewhat skeptical, excursion into the manners and customs of Americans in this time of prosperity."

"My Lord Monleigh" by Jan Cox Speas is a historical romance laid in Scotland at the time of Cromwell's rule.

"The Trumpet of God" by David Duncan is a novel of the Children's Crusade in 1212.

"A Dram of Poison" by Charlotte Armstrong is a story about a middle-aged man who, in con-

templating suicide, loses the poison, following which a frantic search for it begins.

"Hilda Manning" by Allan Seager is a novel about a young farm woman who is married to an older man and who unwittingly brings tragedy to those about her.

"The Flight" by Ruth Stephan is a historical novel based on the psychological, political and spiritual life of Sweden's Queen Kristina of the seventeenth century.

"The Heel of Spring" by Frank Rooney is the story of a murderer's aftermath as seen through the eyes of one of the murderer's children who had been brought up in ignorance of the crime and his real parentage.

"Men in Arms" by Richard Preston and others is "a history of warfare and its inter-relationships with western society."

"Blue Chip Haggerty" by Ray Millholland is a collection of stories that appeared originally in the Saturday Evening Post and follow Blue Chip's career from
