There's a breath of fresh air blowing across the nation in the form of grass-roots demands for more economy in government. A few breezes are hitting Oregon, but they don't seem to be coming from the people who are paying the ever-increasing tax bills.

On a national scale military spending has for too long been among the untouchables with the view that any economy would weaken the country's defenses against enemy attack. The "new look" carries with it more logic in that there can be some cuts made by eliminating many of the needless extravagances that neither prepare the nation for an emergency nor benefit boys who must receive military training.

Right down the line through foreign aid, veterans affairs, agriculture, welfare and all other phases of needs, those who might have been involved in any or all of them are taking a second look and beginning to approach the mounting problem of unreasonable taxes with reasonable analysis rather than the defeatist viewpoint that, "They're going to spend the money anyhow, so we might as well try to get our share."

On a state basis indications are that huge increases in the budget talked about at the beginning of the legislative session, will not come about and that taxes will not reach the confiscatory point that was once feared. The new approach to more economy in Oregon can be credited to several state legislators like Sen. Tony Yturri and Rep. Emil Stunz, who are more interested in the people they represent than the powerful lobby groups who sometimes speak for a small minority.

It's difficult to look into any crystal ball and immediately see lower national and state taxes, but the runaway spending may be stopped, or at least slowed to a walk.
