

Sen. Yturri Proposes Method Change For Higher Education Appropriations

First, I am most happy to announce that yesterday I obtained permission of the rules committee to introduce a senate joint memorial to be submitted to Congress for the purpose of urging the immediate appropriation for and construction of the Bully Creek dam. Rep. Stunz and I have been working on this for several weeks, and I have finally introduced the memorial and it is my hope it will have enough influence on congress to bring about the appropriation.

Party Lines on John Day

The Republicans and Democrats voted again along party lines this week on house joint memorial No. 1, designed to urge congress to appropriate funds for John Day dam. The Republicans moved that an amendment be added which would assure to Oregon a "fair and equitable share" of the power produced. The Democrats felt that inclusion of such a clause might delay the appropriation. The vote on the amendment was 15 Republicans for, and 15 Democrats against. We then voted on the Memorial without the amendment and it passed unanimously.

Higher Education Eyed

We are having a difficult time in the ways and means committee with every type of educational measure, and with budgets. The basic school support increase from \$80 to \$120 per child has brought about many lengthy deliberations, but the problems of higher education are even more provocative of night sessions and furrowed foreheads.

In ex-Gov. Smith's budget, there exists \$3.6 million for college and university faculty salary increases. Of this amount, \$1.2 million is earmarked for "across the board" increases, and 2.4 million is stipulated for a "scale improvement fund" which is to be used during the 1957-59 biennium for salary adjustments. The board of higher education had requested 4.8 million for salary increases, but this was reduced by Gov. Smith's department of finance to \$3.6 million. Governor Holmes promised that he would restore the cut, and there is more "whispering in corners" and scurrying about than you can imagine.

Feeder's Day Set For April 10 Malheur Station

The annual Livestock Feeder's Day at the Malheur Experiment station will be held Wednesday, April 10, starting at noon with a free lunch, E. N. Hoffman, superintendent announced this week.

Feeds under test this year have included ammoniated beet pulp, a new possible high protein feed, which has been compared to regular beet pulp and a protein supplement of comparable protein content. The development of the ammoniated beet pulp has been under the direction of Frank Rawlings, research director of the Amalgamated Sugar Co. Protein content of the material is about 20 percent.

In addition to feed comparison two methods of supplying still-betrol have been compared. These have been by feeding and by implanting, Hoffman said.
