TB Association Elects Officers; Eyes Program

Members of the Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health Association held their annual dinner meeting and election at the Moore Hotel last Tuesday night.

Alvin Hicks, Ontario was re-elected president of the association; Elvin Ballou of Nyssa, first vice president; Arthur Smith, Vale, second vice-president, Mrs. W. A. Wilt, Nyssa, secretary, and Bill Blackaby, treasurer. Mrs. Madge Flegel is representative director to the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association and Mrs. Merry Johnson, executive secretary.

The annual report revealed that contributions to the 1956 Christmas seal sale in Malheur county reached a total of \$5,516.50. Of this amount, \$4,082.21 was retained by the local association for their program; \$1,103.30 went for support of the program of the Oregon TB and health association and 6 percent or \$330.99 was contributed to the National association for medical research and education.

Twelve new cases of tuberculosis were found in Malheur county in 1956, 25 were under supervision of the health department and five people remain in the hospital now.

Don Harman, case-finding director, Oregon TB and Health Association, Portland, presented some of the problems in finding tuberculosis today. He said our case-finding programs are not finding patients soon enough.

Last year 30 per cent more people were admitted to hospitals in Oregon than the two previous years. There is also the problem of taking hundreds of chest X-rays and then finding little or no tuberculosis.

He gave some of the advantages of hospital admission X-ray programs. Hospitals which have established routine X-ray admission programs are finding from two to 10 times more cases of unknown tuberculosis than X-ray programs leveled at the man on the street.

In Oregon at this time, well over a third of all patients admitted to general hospitals are offered in-going admission X-ray programs. Of this number, thirteen hospitals have equipment purchased from Christmas Seal funds.

Nine other general hospitals approached by TB associations have accepted the program and will be in operation in the near future.

Chest X-Ray Due in County This Summer

The mobile chest x-ray unit will be set up in Malheur county for an approximate 27-day visit for county-wide screening of all residents. Mrs. Edna Blaylock, county health nurse announced following confirmation by Dr. Churchill, director of the tuberculosis section of the state board of health.

Dr. Churchill plans to be here next Wednesday to help perfect the program for the visit of the unit in this county.

Tuberculin patch testing was launched for Malheur county April 12 when a small number of first grade students in Pioneer, Lindberg, Valley View and Lincoln schools were administered tests. Mrs. Blaylock reported. One reactor was discovered in the first readings Wednesday.

Patch testing will be continued for children in the first grade, seventh grade and high school seniors in the Nyssa, Adrian, Vale and Ontario areas.

Mrs. Blaylock is assisted by Mrs. Henry Quast, registered nurse of Nyssa and Mrs. Chris Davis, who is employed to keep records for the patch testing program.

Nolan M. Field, representative of the Farm Bureau insurance company, was guest speaker at the April 9 meeting of the Arcadia Livestock club.

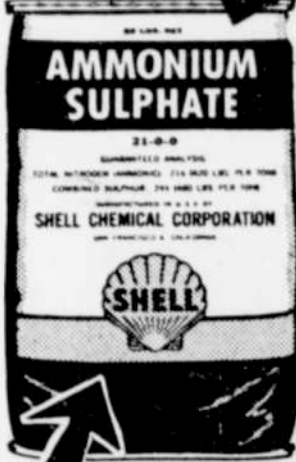

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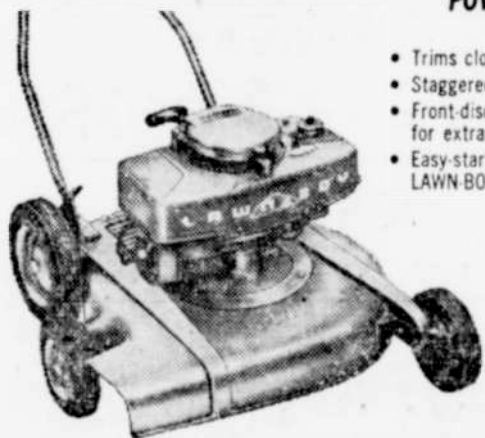
