10 Years Ago—March 27, 1947

E. P. Hendricks has resigned as Malheur county assessor to take the position as manager of the Oregon Clay Products near Vale. The population of Nyssa increased 594 during the period from 1940 to March 24, 1947. Edison Child and Robert Child, brothers of Utah, have purchased the Inland Oil Co. from the Bybee Bros. Tom Bates received an award as winner of the cross-country run conducted by Track Coach K. E. Keeveren of the Nyssa high school last Thursday.

15 Years Ago—March 26, 1942

Joe Robertson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Artie Robertson, who has been attending OSC, has joined the Navy Air Corps. Gas rationing was protested in eastern Oregon on the same basis as in western Oregon. The mountain range has been the dividing line in Oregon and eastern Oregon will be compelled to compete with ration free Idaho, George Aiken, secretary of the interior reported. Mrs. John Ostrom received a letter from her sister in Sweden which was enroute two months via air mail and cost \$140 postage. First man in Malheur county to have his name called in the new draft, was Frank Bilboa, Ontario.

Personal narratives and recollections, foreign policy and political history and humorous anecdotes are included in the books going into circulation Saturday, April 20, at Malheur county library.

"Bears in My Kitchen" by Margaret Merrill tells the story of a city girl who married a U. S. ranger and adapted herself to life in the wilds of various national parks of the West.

Shirley Jackson further reminisces about family doings in "Raising Demons," in the same vein as her earlier book, "Life Among the Savages."

"American Politics in a Revolutionary World" by Chester Bowles is based on lectures at Harvard in 1956, and in his concern for an effective foreign policy the author describes three previous times in our history when old alignments and slogans were inadequate in meeting new problems.

Edison Marshall's hunting adventures are the subject of "Heart of the Hunter" which tells of shooting tigers in Asia, lions in Africa and grizzlies in Canada.

"A Piece of My Mind" is a collection of essays by Edmund Wilson on varied topics and bears the subtitle, "Reflections at Sixty."

Bennett Cerf's new collection of anecdotes, puns, fables and yarns is called "The Life of the Party."

"Battle Hymn" by Dean Hess is the life story of a clergyman turned fighter pilot that was also the subject of a recent movie of the same name.

"The Bible as History" by Werner Keller documents the historical foundations of the Old and New Testaments from archeological evidence.

"American-Asian Tensions" edited by Robert Strausz-Hupe and others discusses India and Indo-

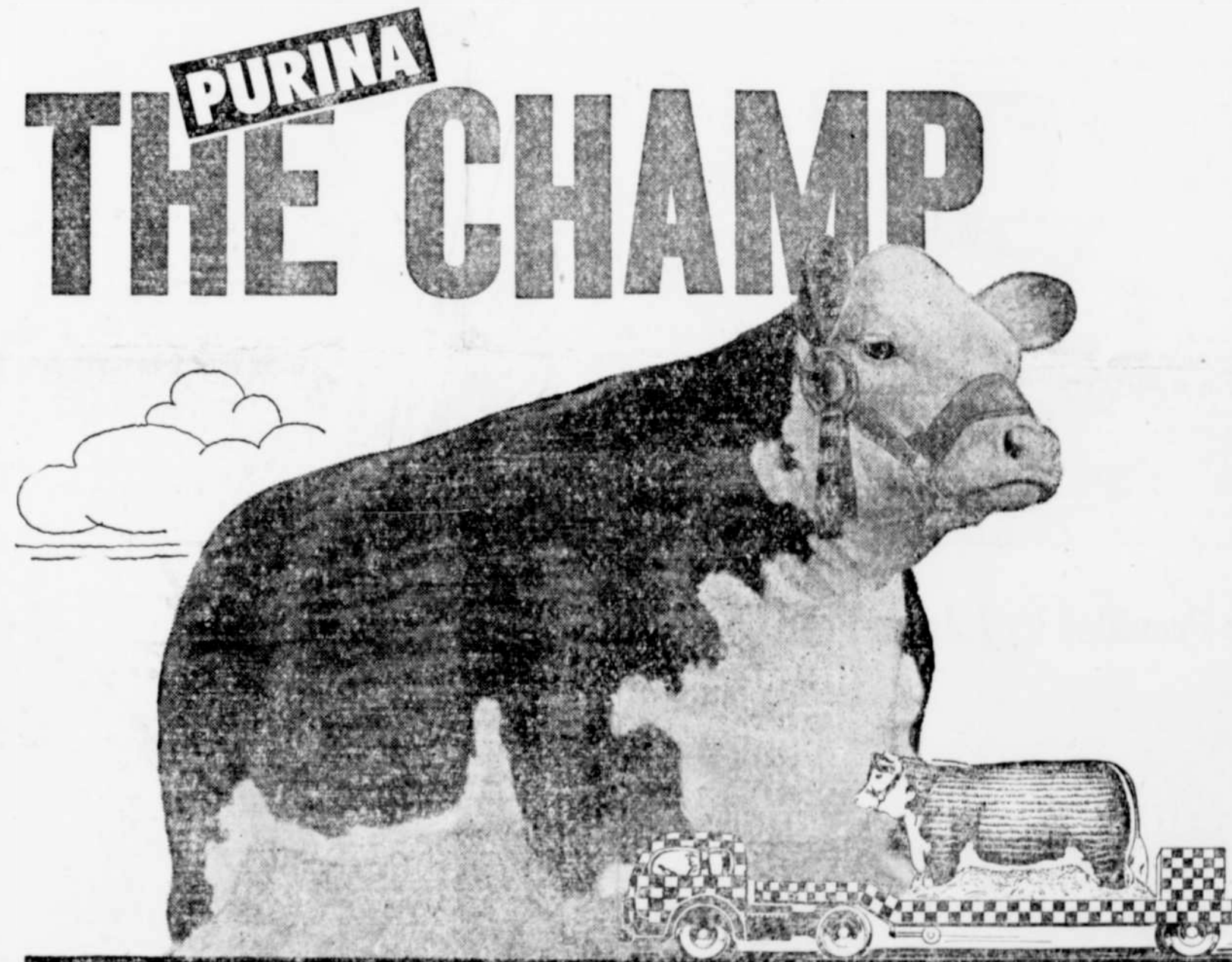
