

Nyssa Library Puts New Books Into Circulation

A list of new books now in circulation at the Nyssa city library has been released by Mrs. Desmond Jones, librarian.

Fiction
"The Bridge" by Pamela Frankau. Earthly and spiritual truths are woven into the fabric of this novel by a British author. David Neilson, a writer, is seen as he crosses the bridge linking this world with the next. Along the way he relives crucial events experienced in childhood, youth and middle age.

"The Scapegoat" by Daphne Du Maurier. On his way to a French monastery where he hopes to discover some meaning in his empty existence, an Englishman encounters his double, a Frenchman contemplating flight from a life crowded with unwelcome responsibilities.

"The Wild Swan" by Margaret Kennedy is a successful play idealizing a minor Victorian poetess and writer of children's books, to be remade by a motion picture company depicting the "real" story of poetess Dorothea Harding.

"Prize Stories, 1937" by Paul Engle is the 37th volume in the O. Henry awards series and the fourth to be edited by Engle. He has been assisted by Constance Urdang in compiling a collection which seeks to bring the public stories of lasting literary merit.

"The Story of Gabrielle" by Catherine Gabrielson tells of a girl's last days on earth and of how, through her love and strength of spirit, she was able to illuminate the joyous nature of living as a lasting gift to her mother.

In "These Thousand Hills" by A. B. Guthrie, Jr., Lat Evans was 20 when he struck out for himself in a job trailing cattle from Oregon to Montana, a country of dramatic beauty, potential wealth and severest privation. It was a life where the biggest fight might have to be settled in a man's mind without a gun to rely on, or settled between two women who loved him.

"The Fruit Tramp" by Vinnie Williams is the story of the boy, Polk Watson and the country near Lake Okechobee, a great green river of saw grass and prairie with sparkleberry and palmetto, dotted with hammocks, not beautiful unless you knew all the birds and the animals and the

little things that lived there in the shade of the grasses.

"The Last Angry Man" by Gerold Green tells of Samuel Abelman, M.D., 1553 Haven Place. They all knew him in that grimy Brooklyn district, teenage hoodlums, cops, kosher butchers, hymn chanting members of the Whole United Army of God. A man of inexhaustible indignation, he conducted a one-man campaign against "galoots" everywhere — the people who thought the world owed them a living. He didn't look like a doctor, or talk like one, so they called him a failure but his vigor and bawdy humor remained indestructible. He emerges as one of the most powerful and appealing figures in recent fiction.

In "Bon Voyage!" by Marrijane and Joseph Hayes, Harry Willard, typical father and husband from Terre Haute, Ind., relates with droll good humor and comedy the heart-warming adventures and misadventures that he and his family encountered on an action-packed vacation of six weeks in Europe.

"The Life of the Party" is by Bennett Cerf, author, publisher, columnist, public speaker and one of the bright stars of TV's "What's My Line?" Here are the choicest chuckles from all over the world, gathered into a new and natty collection of stories, jokes, puns and limericks.

"The Brothers Karamazov" by Fedor Dostoyevsky presents an unparalleled picture of Tsarist Russia. On the surface it is a violent story of three brothers and their cruel, sensual father. Each brother feels wronged in a different way, but only one is the logical suspect when the father is brutally murdered. Was Dmitri guilty or not is the question leading to the deeper significance of the novel, also a chronicle of man's struggle for his soul.

"Manhunt" by Donald Mackenzie is the frightening story of Paul Gregory and the dragnet a city cast for him. Gregory is first encountered as he plans and executes a daring escape from London's Wandsworth prison. The pace quickens steadily as he struggles with all his wits and stamina to keep his freedom, while his pursuers draw near. He is betrayed by those who might help him and one by one the various avenues of escape close to him.

Festival Planned For Homemakers

The 10th annual county-wide homemakers festival will be held at the East Side Cafe, Ontario, on May 1, from 10:30 to 3:30. The theme is "Building for Tomorrow."

This past year, 362 project leaders have been trained to carry information on yeast rolls, salads and salad dressings, party planning and herbs and other seasonings back to some 1,095 Malheur county homemakers. 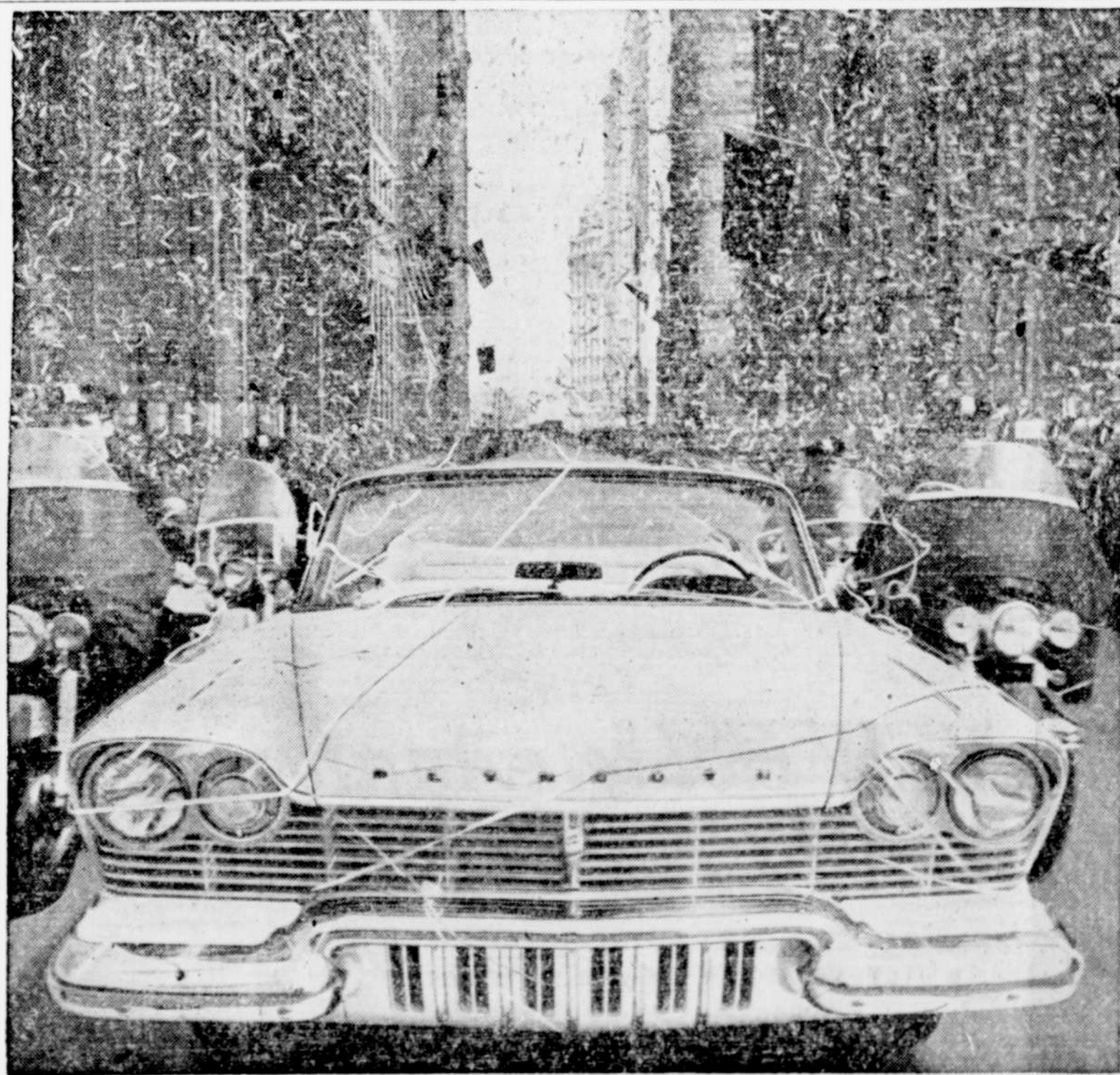
