Area Bank Debits Show Increase Over Year Ago

Bank debits for March for the Burns, Ontario and Nyssa area showed an increase of 20.9 percent over February of this year, an increase of 4.7 percent over March of last year. Total bank debits for the area were \$19,589,928, with five banks reporting. . . . Bank debits for the entire state, totalling \$1,588,612,459 with 165 banks reporting, indicated a rise of 12.1 percent from February, 1957 and also a gain of 5.1 percent over March a year ago.

Bank debits, regarded as good indicators of business activity, represent the dollar value of checks drawn against the deposit accounts of individuals and business firms. The Bureau of Municipal Research collects bank debits monthly.
