10 Years Ago—April 17, 1947

Principal Erret Hummel, Lynn Lawrence, Leno Christensen, Mrs. Fern Anderson, Dortha Henne-man and Robert Tolbert, teachers in the Nyssa schools, have submitted their resignations. . . John Koopman, Vale, former deputy sheriff, has been appointed Malheur county assessor by the county court, succeeding Ed Hendrix, resigned. . . Sixteen thousand rainbow trout were planted in the Owyhee river by the state game commission with the help of the Malheur Game league. . . The Antelope Times, official newspaper of Adrian high school, was awarded a cup for the best bi-weekly mimeographed newspaper in the state at the 19th annual contest of the Oregon High School Press association.

15 Years Ago—April 16, 1942

The Farm Security Administration officers of Malheur county have received authority from the U.S. government to purchase property along the Snake river from Mrs. Emma Quinby for a farm labor camp. A budget of \$100,000 has been approved for a utility building and 300 labor shelters. . . June Marie Wilson, Nyssa, will conduct the chorus at the all-campus sing contest at the University of Oregon April 23.

20 Years Ago—April 15, 1937

The local CCC camp entertained 200 visitors at the camp last week which was national open house week for CCC camps. . . The Owyhee river is filled to capacity with water run-off from the Owyhee dam which is releasing 14,000 second feet of water today. Water will be turned into canals in Cow Hollow and Locket Gulch. . . The Fred Hite children in the Owyhee who have been crossing the river in a car or a foot bridge to attend school, have found it necessary to use a boat due to high water.

30 Years Ago—April 15, 1927

Original flood claims filed by farmers who lost property in the Bully creek flood in 1925 are on file at the courthouse. Judge Dalton Biggs will hear the claims read in circuit court. \$50,000 will be pro-rated among Bully creek flood sufferers. . . J. D. Lackey reported shooting a dog that took two of his sheep. . . Closing of the land office in Vale by the federal government and moving it to The Dalles is causing protests far and wide in Eastern Oregon.
