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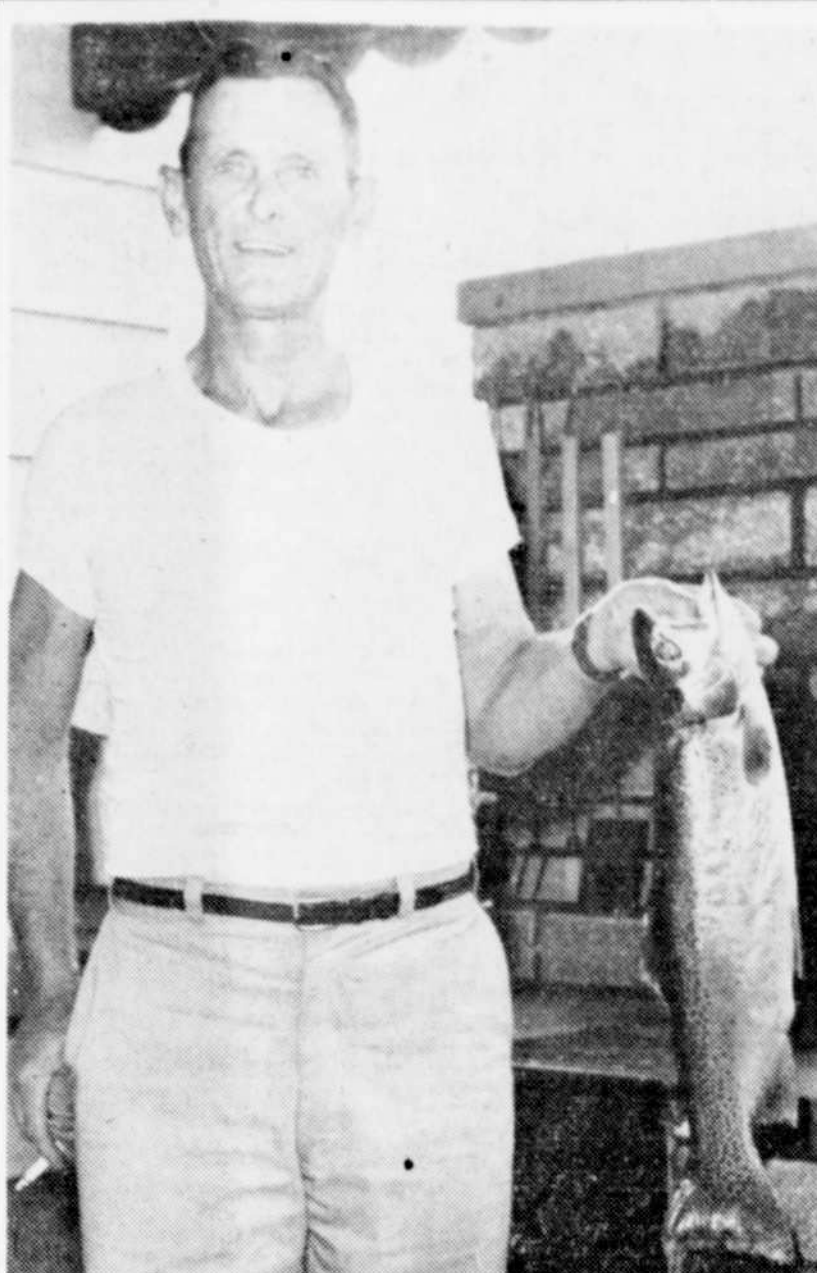

Bulldogs Rate Second Place In State Meet

The Nyssa Bulldogs rolled up 29 points to capture second place in the annual state A-2 track and field meet held Saturday at Oregon State college, Corvallis. Eagle Point came in first with 40 points; North Marion, third with 27 and Oakridge, fourth with 25 points.

The Bulldogs managed to eliminate 55 of the 56 teams they had to face, but lacked the punch to overcome the efforts of Eagle Point's Wayne Christian who scored three first places, totaling 30 points of his team's 40 points. The athletes were handicapped with a loose, muddy track after an early morning downpour.

The Nyssa squad qualified for the state meet after winning the district 7 A-2 championship title at Burns the previous Saturday. Nyssa boys vieing for the state crown were Larry Schenk, Gerald Talbot, Dirk Rinehart, Joe Sanders, Don Walker, Dennis Forbess, John Messick and Dennis Savage.

The Bulldogs and Coach Kinsey Keveren were also at Corvallis Friday for the state preliminaries.

Nyssa's Scoring
Six of the Bulldogs scored with Larry Schenk leading with 10 points for placing second in the 100 yard dash and 880 relay. Dennis Forbess scored 8 points for second in the discus; Gerald Talbot, 6 points for fourth in the 220 yard dash and second in the 880 relay.

Dirk Rinehart and Joe Sanders each scored 2 points for placing second in the 880 relay and Dennis Savage gleaned 1 point for his sixth place in the 880 yard run.

Local fans will get their first look at the Nyssamen a week from Sunday when it is planned they will meet the newest—and toughest entry in Border league play—Mountain Home Air Base.

While happy with prospects to date Manager Hugh Tobler is concerned in that some of the local players have not been showing up at the practice field—and there's still room for a good infielder and outfielder.

The Beelmen, who last year fought their way to the playoffs look even stronger this season both offensively and defensively.

For pitchers they can put three rough lefties on the mound. They are Bob Perkins, College of Idaho, Fred Ballard, who tossed three no-hitters for Notus this year and

Turnouts are scheduled every night next week starting at 6:30 p.m. and local players are urged to "get in the ballgame."
