

4-H Club Winners at Spring Show Last Thursday, Friday Announced

The Malheur county Spring 4-H show, was enjoyed last week by 4-H club members, leaders and parents from all parts of the county. The number participating was somewhat higher than in previous years. There were 545 exhibits, 218 were made by members enrolled in cooking clubs, 291 in clothing clubs and 36 in wood working, camp coking, poster and flower garden clubs.

Each project exhibited was placed by the judges in either the blue, red, white or green class according to the quality of the exhibit. From those placing in the blue ribbon class a champion was selected from each division. The first division in clothing, "Just So Girl" and the first division in cooking, "Meal Time Fun" are not judged in competition.

The champions in each division of foods projects are Easy Meals, Mike Gribbins; Main Dish Meals, Dianna Fraudt; Junior Dinner club, Jill Nielson; Senior Dinner club, Bernice Jorgenson.

A travelogue, a discussion of mountain climbing, a couple's tribulations in an adoption attempt, facts about hailstorms and recent successful plays are to be found in books heading the list of those going into circulation Saturday, June 15 at the Malheur county library.

"This Delicious Land: Portugal" by Marie Noele Kelly is a traveler's description of a land of traditions and modern developments.

"On Climbing" is by Charles Evans, a member of the team that conquered Everest and it includes description of the technique of climbing; reminiscence to illustrate practical points and to share the author's pleasures of days on the mountains; and also some technical chapters.

"For Love of Martha" by Marjorie Winter tells of the involvements of a couple unable to secure a child from a well-known adoption agency who then tried through another seemingly reputable agency to adopt a little girl.

"Hailstorms of the United States" by Snowden Flora gives a panoramic view of these storms and their destructive power which is greater than that of tornadoes.

"Theatre '56" contains reading versions of a dozen plays of the year, including "The Diary of Anne Frank," "A View from the Bridge," "The Ponder Heart," and "No Time for Sergeants."

"Mushroom Growing Today" by Frederick Atkins is a new edition of a work first published in 1950, bringing up to date the materials on modern specialist requirements, the technique of growing and diseases and pests.

"Century of Conflict" by Joseph Rutledge is the story of the struggle between France and England for control of the North American continent culminating in the fall of Quebec in 1759.
