

## Nyssa Beetmen Defeat Payette, 8-4 To Run Win Streak to Five Straight

Playing before a near record crowd the Nyssa Beetmen Tuesday night disposed of Payette 8 to 4 in a beautifully played game to take their second straight Border league contest and their fifth victory in a row for the season.

### Adrian Defeated By Gaston '9' In Title Play

The Adrian Antelopes came close, awfully close, to winning the state class "B" championship when they clashed with Gaston at Multnomah stadium in Portland Saturday.

Six errors, four of which gave Gaston two of its three runs spelled the difference between the clubs. Hatch almost matched the winning pitcher Van Loo pitch for pitch giving up but five hits while the Antelopes were collecting four.

Gaston took a one-run lead in the first inning. The Antelopes knotted the score in the top of the fifth with singles by Looney and Sayre connecting.

Gaston came back in the bottom of the fifth to go ahead 2-1.

In the top of the seventh and final inning Adrian tied the game. Hartley singled to open the inning. Looney reached first on an error. Price sacrificed the runners along. Culbertson struck out then Thompson singled scoring Hartley. Looney, attempting to score on the same single was nipped at the plate.

Two errors in the crucial bottom half of the seventh allowed Gaston to score the winning run and capture the championship.

It was a tough game to lose and the Antelope errors could be attributed to over-eagerness rather than to sloppy playing.

But at that, the area is proud of the Adrian team which went all the way to the big game on consistently fine play.

And folks in the Portland area now know where Adrian, and, we hope, Nyssa is located.

Barnes, a consistent winner for Nyssa last year, didn't have his usual stuff but is expected to come back with a little practice.
