

Owyhee Pioneer Picnic Scheduled For September 8

It has been announced this week by Fred Pullen, Owyhee pioneer, now residing in Kuna, Idaho, that the annual Owyhee pioneer picnic is scheduled for Sunday, Sept. 8 at the Nyssa City Park beginning at 12:30 p. m.

A cow bell will start ringing at 12:30 to announce the pot luck dinner. All Owyhee and Nyssa pioneers are invited. Each family is requested to bring a covered dish and their own table service.

The Owyhee pioneer picnic is held each year at the beautiful Nyssa City Park in the shade and is known for miles around for serving delicious food and good hot coffee. The old pioneers look forward to this picnic each year and come from long distances to attend. They visit about the good old days when they burned sage brush and drove a covered wagon to Nyssa to get grub to last them through the winter.

The cow bell which they ring each year at the picnic, is rung in memory of a Texas long horn brindle milch cow that wore such a bell strapped around her neck. The cow had a spread of horns over six feet from tip to tip. She ran the range in the belly deep bunch grass between Mitchell Butte and Mud Springs. Two French trappers witnessed the old brindle attacked by a pack of hungry coyotes. They had her up against the rim rock, she was long-legged, long-backed, and long-tailed as well as long horned. She fought with blood in her eyes to protect her little bull calf. The trappers said she held a dead coyote on each horn. Only a specimen now remains to exemplify this breed of long horn cattle that made more history than any other of the bovine genus.

In the early days Dr. J. J. Sarazin rode a big black mustang saddle horse to Owyhee and Jordan Valley through deep snow, to care for the sick. Truly a pioneer doctor, he wore a big .45 on his hip for protection.

Cow boys and P L and S riders would give their saddle horses whiskey to drink when running wild horses. Running wild horses was one of the most colorful occupations of the old west. Every old timer who has passed on has meant a loss of early history to the generation to come.

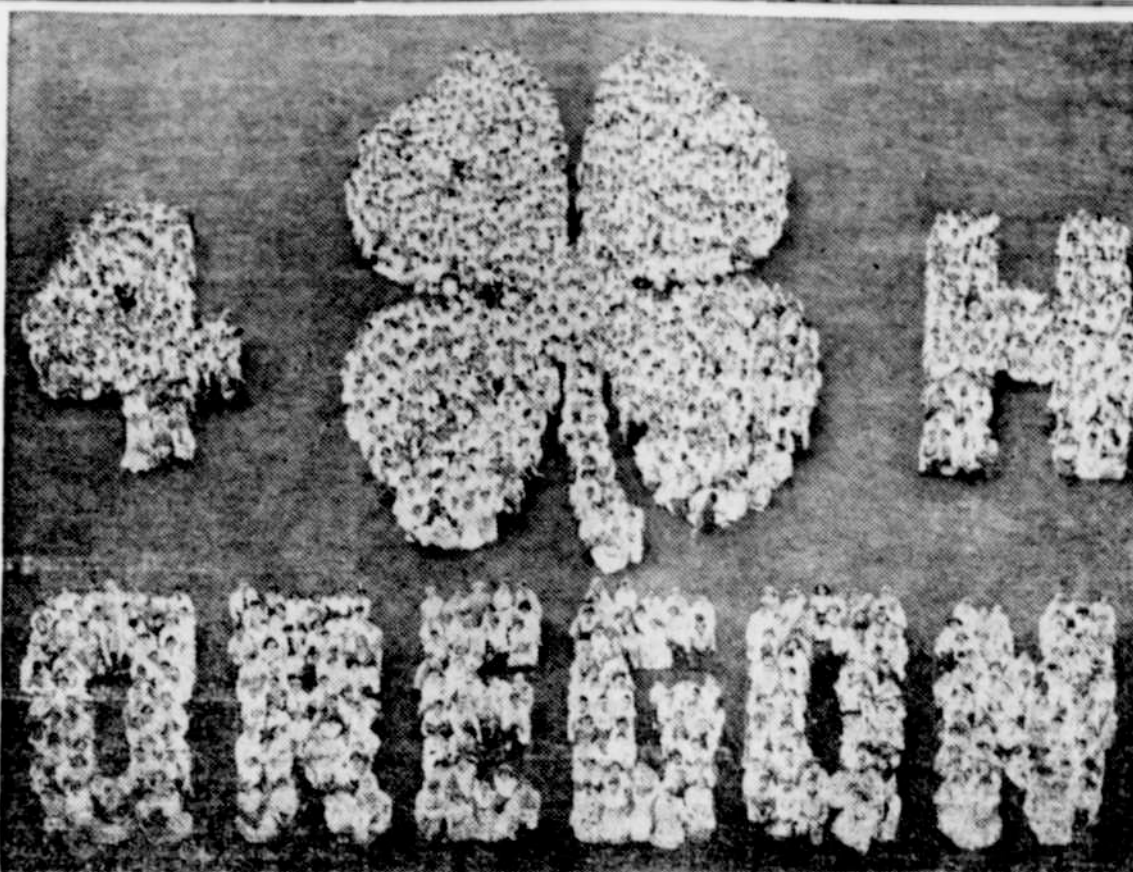

Oregon Liquor Control Commission Clarifies Issue of Enforcement

The Oregon Liquor Control commission does not usurp the powers of city police, Joseph Nance, administrator of the OLCC in Portland, told The Gate City Journal Monday. Nance was called by The Journal after an interview was permitted by another news media last Friday about the newspaper's editorial questioning the OLCC's scope of activities in licensing taverns.

Nance emphasized that his commission's activities are mainly administrative functions and that police work is left up to cities and any problem is one for local enforcement through district attorneys and local police.

The Journal asked for clarification of policy, not necessarily the law itself, regarding ORS 471.410 on the sale or gift of liquor to minor or intoxicated persons. Nance replied that action has been taken several times on cases involving sale of beer and liquor to persons under 21 and to persons under orders of interdiction.

Activities of Bill Courtney, OLCC investigator for Malheur county, which were not questioned in The Journal's editorial, were reviewed by Nance who said that he visited Nyssa 15 times during May and had consulted with local police on numerous occasions. Courtney's duties involve all of Malheur county covering approximately 100 licensed establishments. Here again, Nance emphasized duties of all investigators are primarily just that—investigation—and not enforcement of the law.

The Journal emphasized to Nance its position in questioning the OLCC policies and not the activities of any one individual connected with the commission and further clarified its stand that under ORS 471.410 there are three points:

(1) Liquor shall not be sold to any person under the age of 21, (2) liquor shall not be sold to any person who is visibly intoxicated, (3) or to a person who has been interdicted. Nance repeated the commission's contention that all three are matters for local law enforcement officers to report to the OLCC.

When Nance stated that good public relations are desired by his department, it was suggested that news of suspension of beer or liquor licenses should not be withheld from publication. The liquor commissioner called attention to a local case in which the owner of the Smoke Shop at Nyssa has been given 90 days to dispose of her establishment after action June 5 (before the Journal's editorial was published) but which has not been made public.

Nance admitted that members of the OLCC are unfamiliar with individual problems throughout the state and must act only on those cases which are processed through regular channels, usually involving local police or other local law enforcement officers.

Nance reminded The Journal that the city in 1956 received \$3,772 from liquor funds and the county received \$18,495 from the same fund. The 1957 legislature doubled the amount to go to cities, Nance said, and indirectly expressed the opinion that such funds should be used for law enforcement expense.

MOTHER INJURED IN FALL AT HOME IN PORTLAND
