Nine angry men will take the field Friday night when the Nyssa Beetmen collide with Mountain Home.

There is a reason for it which many of you know. Last Friday Nyssa dropped their first game of the season in a contest played at Mountain Home in a 9 to 8 ballgame with Mountain Home's victory being questioned to say the least.

Not having been there your reporter can only pass the word along to you sports fans as to what happened. It seems there was a ground rule covering balls hit in fair territory but which may have bounced into the tall weeds to the left of the third base line, limiting same to a two-base hit.

Let's admit it! The Beetmen tried to stretch a lost ball into a triple but the base runner was ordered back to second because of what was, we presume, the ground rule.

What didn't stand up, on the same premise, was a lost ball which went for a home run for the Airmen. Manager Hugh Tobler protested the decision and it is being considered by league officials as of press time. The run made the difference between a win and a loss—Nyssa's first of the season.

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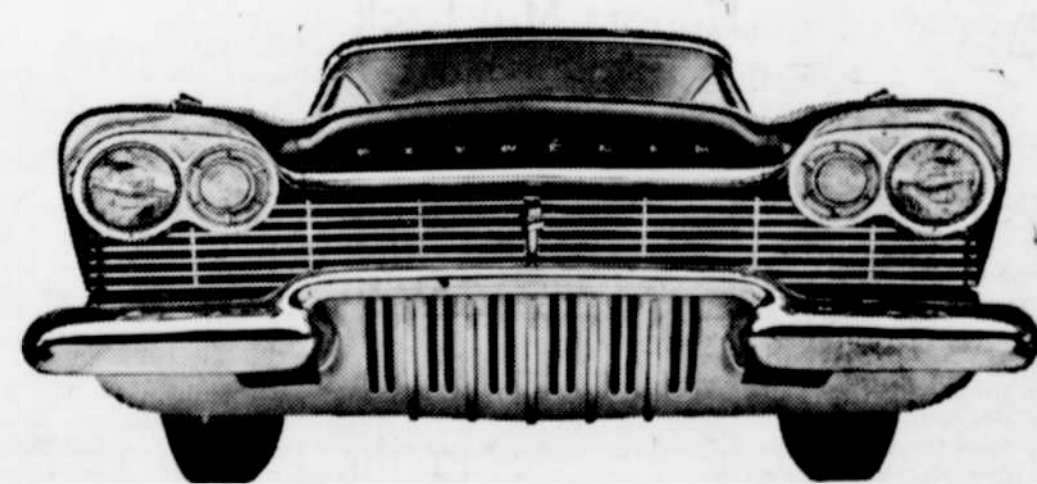
