

Good Summer Reading Listed At County Library

Recent history including the Hungarian uprising and also Pearl Harbor, an actress' autobiography, a "Mr. Moto" suspense story and a comedy novel head a list of good summer reading going into circulation Saturday, July 20, at the Malheur county library.

"The Bridge at Andau" by James Michener is a first-hand account of the Hungarian revolt last year against the Soviets based in part on material the author obtained from refugees who had crossed the bridge at Andau to freedom.

"Day of Infamy" by Walter Lord traces the human drama of the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

Diana Barrymore, celebrated actress and debutante, tells her story of great expectations, inward torment and unhappy marriages in "Too Much, Too Soon."

"Stopover: Tokyo" is a suspense story by J. P. Marquand in which Mr. Moto appears and American intelligence officers seek to break up a Communist espionage and terrorist ring.

"Say, Darling" by Richard Bissell is a humorous novel about a budding young author from Indiana who arrives in New York for a collaboration that is supposed to make a musical comedy of his novel.

"The Black Obelisk" by Erich Remarque is a novel of ideas whose hero is a young war veteran taking up life in a provincial German city in the 1923 days of inflation and reviving nationalism.

"Onionhead" is a novel by Weldon Hill with a Coast Guard background in which a frustrated, baffled young American gains maturity and character.

John Steinbeck's "The Short Reign of Pippin IV" is a satirical extravaganza on French politics in which France runs out of material for coalition governments and restores the monarchy in the person of a middle-aged astronomer, descendant of Charlemagne.

"Wife to Henry V" by Hilda Lewis is a novel built around the life of Catherine of Valois.

"Stay Alive All Your Life" by Norman Vincent Peale carries further the author's philosophy of successful and happy living as expressed in his earlier book, "The Power of Positive Thinking."

10 Years Ago—July 17, 1947

Miss Ardye Hurst of Adrian was selected as one of the attendants of Miss Florence Webb of Ontario who was chosen to reign as queen of the Malheur county fair in September. . . . The temperature soared to 103 degrees, the highest of the year, July 14 in Nyssa. . . . Representatives of six chambers of commerce, including Nyssa, attended a hearing at Lewiston, Ida., to oppose construction of a government dam in Hells Canyon of the Snake river. . . . The Railroad Express agency announced the appointment of an exclusive agent for Nyssa and free express delivery to all points within the city.

20 Years Ago—July 15, 1937
Special serum ordered by Dr. J. J. Sarazin and brought by plane from Philadelphia is credited with saving the life of Horace Chaney of Big Bend who was suffering from a rare disease, anthrax, contracted from a diseased calf on the Chaney farm. . . . Fire ravaged the home of Eddie Powell Thursday morning with loss of furniture and personal belongings. The Powells were at their mining property at Prairie City.

30 Years Ago—July 15, 1927
