A woman's adventures at 64, several novels and a flier's reminiscences are included in books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 3, at Malheur county library.

"Traveler in the Wilderness" by Cid Ricketts Summer recounts how the author at 64, in answer to an advertisement, joined an expedition of seven men to voyage by rubber raft through the canyon country on the Green and Colorado rivers.

"Blind Tiger," a novel by Digby Gerahty, tells of an American on the European continent and his conflicts over his money, his ideals and the girl he loves.

Ruby Ferguson takes the reader into Edwardian England in her novel, "For Every Favour," in which Eddie Boan rises to head butler under a dignified pseudonym, Edward Shrewsbury.

"Nina" by Luise Rinser is a novel set in the Germany of the past 25 years, a love story of a forceful girl and a man too high-minded to act.

"The Flying Years" is Lou Reichers' account of his career which has included World War II duty in the Air Corps Ferrying Command, flying Harriman on a lend-lease mission to Moscow and an endurance test to prove the feasibility of refueling in the air.

"A Treasury of the Dog" is a collection of stories, essays, poems and quotations about dogs.

"Handy Guide to Western Germany" by Bernd Boehle is a reference book for travel describing scenic, historic and artistic attractions from the Black forest to upper Bavaria and from the lower Rhine to the North sea.

"Live Longer and Enjoy It" by Peter Steinerohn is a readable key to physical and mental health.

"The Mystery Writer's Handbook" is a study in the writing, of detective, suspense, mystery and crime stories.

"The Story of the 'Old Colony' of New Plymouth" by Samuel Eliot Morison describes the colony's history from its Separatist beginnings in England to its incorporation in the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1692.

"Discovering Embroidery" by Winsome Douglass describes a wide variety of stitches, shows how to make one's own designs and includes special techniques like quilting and smoking.

A plane piloted by Cecil Morrison, Jr., crashed into a field when Morrison with Howard Smith, Roy Pounds and Mervin Conery were starting on a fishing trip to Chamberlain basin. The men were not injured but the plane, owned by Sam Horne, was badly damaged.

Robert E. Long, who is with the wildlife service holds the all-time record for taking predatory animals in the state of Oregon. He has caught 1028 coyotes. . . Barney Wilson caught a 21-inch trout weighing 3 3/4 pounds, Dr. E. D. Norcutt hooked a 22 1/4-inch trout and Bernard Frost caught a 21 3/4-inch trout in the Owyhee river this week. . . 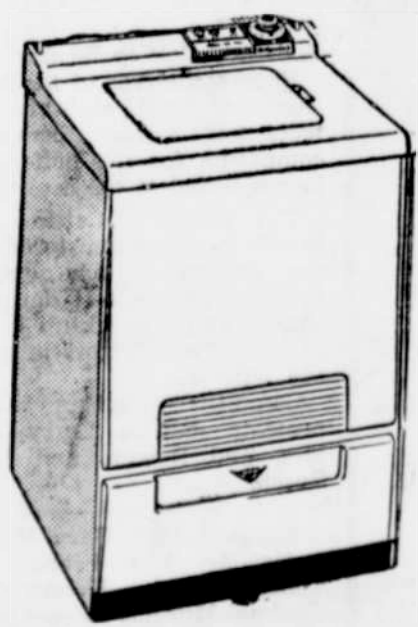

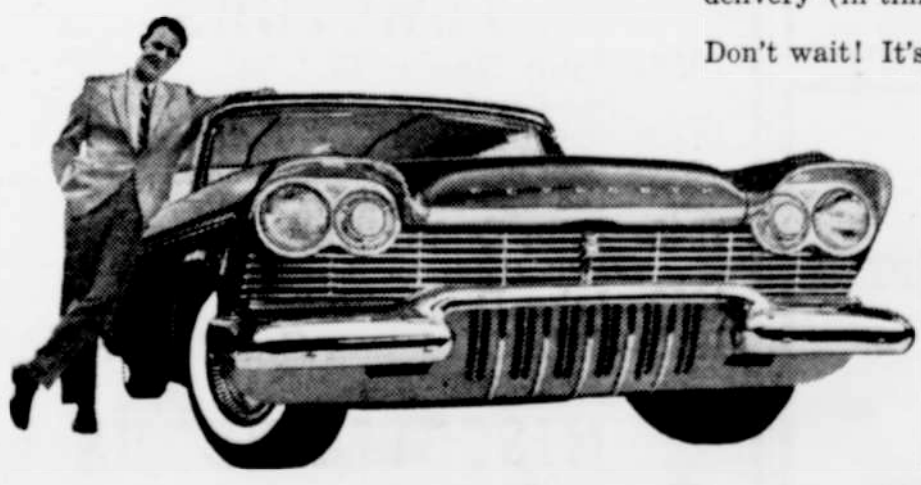
