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Canning Points For Fair Entry

This is the season of the year when most homemakers are canning food for table use during the winter months when fresh fruits and vegetables are hard to get, others are canning for gifts. First: Select standard clear glass containers in perfect condition. Any containers that have cracks, chips or dents should be discarded because these defects prevent airtight seals. Be sure all containers are clean before and after canning.

Second: Select the proper method for processing. For fruits, tomatoes, and pickled vegetables, use a boiling-water-bath canner. You can process these acid foods safely in boiling water. For all common vegetables except tomatoes, use a steam-pressure canner. In order to process low-acid foods safely in a reasonable length of time it takes a temperature higher than that of boiling water.

Remember to check the time for whatever canning method selected. The judge will look for the label containing this information: Standard clear glass containers, labels with name and contents, method and time used in processing, and the date of canning.

Canning for home use will have preference over fancy pack. Quality of the canned products, included, maturity, texture, properly filled, proportion of liquid and solid, clearness of liquid, and appearance.
