

John Simianer's Long Fly in the 8th Scoring Martyn Gives Nyssa Beetmen 3-2 Win Over Boiseans in Thriller

A long fly deep into centerfield by John Simianer scoring Gerry Martyn in the eighth inning turned the tide in favor of the Beetmen and helped them edge Boise 3-2 before 600 fans Tuesday night at the high school field.

For six innings neither team could score in a game featuring good pitching and almost airtight fielding. The Beetmen threatened in the second and again in the fourth but each time Boise put out the fire.

In the fifth, Boise had men on first and third but Ron Heberger fired to third catching the Idahoan leading off. It wasn't until the seventh that either team broke the ice. Boise tallied a run on an error, scoring the man from third. The Beetmen came back when Barnes walked, Hale singled, but the Boise fielder missed the ball scoring Barnes and sending Hale to second.

Nyssa had their big inning in the eighth when Gerry Martyn cracked a double and John Simianer belted a long fly into centerfield. The Boisean misjudged the ball and had to run back to catch it. For a moment, it looked like he would catch it and Martyn held at second. However, he dropped the ball and Martyn raced for the plate. Simianer in the confusion headed for third and the throw to the base was wild sending him on to score.

Trailing 2-1 in the ninth, the Idahoans gave the local crowd a bad scare in the final inning scoring one run on a double after the first batter got on base on an error. However, Ron Heberger

made another sparkling defensive play firing down to second catching the runner off base.

It was an exciting, interesting game from the start keeping most of the fans glued to their seats until the finish. Ralph Coleman, baseball coach at OSC, was among the fans attending the game. The victory gave Nyssa a tie with Boise for the second half standings in the league. The two teams will probably meet again to decide the second half winner. Nyssa already won the first half and holds three wins over Boise against one defeat.

Longer Elk Shoot, Earlier Bird Seasons Set

A week longer general elk season and an earlier pheasant and quail opening highlighted several changes in the tentative rules adopted by the game commission Friday as final hunting regulations for the 1957 seasons.

The rules as adopted would open the general elk season on Oct. 26 on both the east and west side areas. Closing dates would remain the same, Nov. 11, on the coast ranges and Nov. 24 in the Cascade, northeastern and southeastern ranges. In addition, Josephine county in southwestern Oregon was included in the spike bull area.

The pheasant, quail and partridge season was moved ahead one week, opening on Oct. 19 and extending through Nov. 4.

Other than changes for central and coast counties, deer regulations remain the same as tentatively set two weeks ago with a general buck season running from Sept. 28 through Oct. 18 and an either-sex season from Oct. 19 through Oct. 21.

A complete synopsis of the regulation will be available to the public in three or four weeks.

A study of the interstate deer herd this year reveals that the deer population is at approximately the same level that it was a year ago. This fact is revealed in the annual report by the interstate deer herd committee composed of representatives of the Modoc and Fremont national forests, U. S. Bureau of Land Management and California and Oregon game commissions.

A summary of the report shows a total of 11,695 animals was tallied crossing the state line into Oregon between March 27 and May 22 of this year. This figure is only 545 animals less than was tallied a year ago when some 12,240 deer were counted on the same counting strip. That year, the report continues, only nine counting days were lost while inclement weather prevented counting on 17 days in 1957.

Classification of deer on the interstate range last winter indicated ratios of 20 bucks per 100 does and 85 fawns per 100 does. The indicated high fawn reproduction is substantially above the production on most other Oregon mule deer ranges.

Bitterbrush utilization measurements indicated the lightest use of bitterbrush on record. The comparatively light use of bitterbrush is traceable to a greater than normal browse growth in 1956 and the fact that deer had access to other palatable plants through most of the winter. A mild winter also tended to keep the animals widely scattered throughout the range.
