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Variety of New Books Available At County Library

Fiction, wilderness travel, flow-er show ideas, the story of rocket research and a baseball club are subjects covered by new books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 10, at the Malheur county library.

"Canton Barrier" by Andrew Geer is a novel of a flying mercenary in the Chinese war whose planes became involved in helping refugees.

"Pillar of Cloud" by Jackson Burgess tells the story of a westward trek in which two young men joined a small party aiming to find a new and practical way across the plains.

"Go in Beauty" by William Eastlake is a story (the title of which is a Navaho expression of farewell) about two brothers at a New Mexican trading post, one of whom ran off with the other's wife.

"Vanquish the Angel" by Diana Gillon depicts in the form of a novel the struggles of modern Israel and the working out of a Jewish-Gentile marriage.

"The Spirit of the Chase" by Robert Bright is a humorous story of the entanglements experienced by a young Bostonian on the trail of an art masterpiece in France.

"The Handbook of Wilderness Travel" by George Wells gives advice on the back-packing trip, the canoe trip, etc., and gives guidance on the wilderness trails all over the United States.

"Flower Show Themes and Arrangement Classes for Developing Them" by Dorothy Biddle is a useful handbook for garden clubs.

"The Men Behind the Space Rockets" by Heinz Gattmann is a personalized history of rocket design and experiment.

"The Boston Red Sox" by Tom Meany is the story of the baseball club's stars and playing records.

"A Handweaver's Workbook" by Heather Thorpe is a comprehensive handbook with step-by-step directions for the four-harness foot-treadle or hand-operated loom.

"The Teacher's Treasure Chest" is a collection of stories, essays, anecdotes and poems by well-known authors that together form a composite picture of a teacher.

"Your Nation's Capital" by Morgan Beatty is a new guide to the capital city based upon research material originally developed by the Federal Writers' project.

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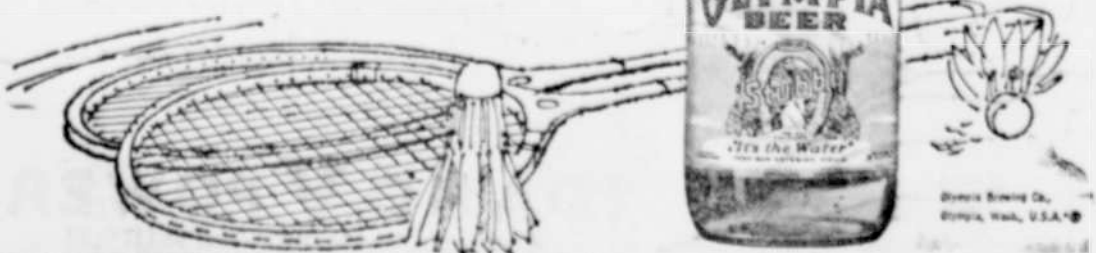
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
