Sandwiches fit into summer snack or lunch time menus in a variety of ways. For tops in the sandwich field, overlap slices of beef and ham on a bun and top with a nippy mustard or horseradish sauce.

Across the back of the tray is a bowl of prepared mustard and a bowl of horseradish. Be sure to have some type of greens included on the tray for the sandwiches. Sesame seed buns act as the basis for these meaty sandwich teasers.

If you're planning to take these sandwiches on a picnic, make them ahead of time . . . then, when it's time to eat, let the family or friends choose their own greens and relish.

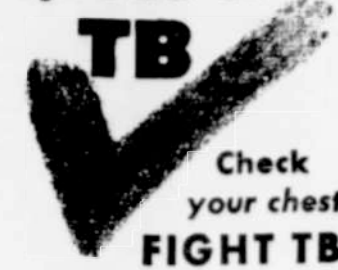
