Nyssa Blasts Payette Packers 15-6 Led by Wilson's First-Inning Homer In Last Home Game of 1957 Season

The Nyssa Beemen ended their season at home with a 15-6 victory over the Payette Packers Tuesday night at the high school field.

A small crowd turned out for the game and saw Payette put up a good fight in the early innings. Nyssa, however, had too much artillery for the game but out-gunned the Idahoans.

In the first inning Dick Wilson belted a long drive over the right field fence, scoring Ron Heberger to give Nyssa a 2-0 lead.

Payette bounced back by scoring three runs in the top of the third after loading the bases. Josephson, Payette pitcher, bunted with the bases loaded. A long fly scored another run and a single brought in the third tally.

The Beemen tied the game in the second when Ron Bates singled and scored on Filmore's grounder. Nyssa came back to score four runs in the third on doubles by Ron Bates and Dale Filmore.

The local club scored two runs in the fifth on Ken Ackerman's triple driving in Bates. Ackerman then scored on a wild pitch.

Payette tallied two runs in the sixth but Nyssa came back to tally three. The Beemen added three more runs for insurance in the eighth while Payette got one tally.

Dick Wilson won a five dollar award from J. R. Simplot company for his towering circuit clout in the opening inning.

This was the last regular home game for Nyssa. The Beemen are now tied with Boise for the second half championship and according to Manager Hugh Tobler they are trying to make arrangements to play the tie-breaking game here in the near future. Nyssa's next regular game is in Nampa Friday night.

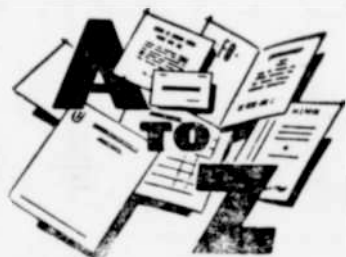
They have a game planned for Monday night. Dale Bingham is manager of the team.
