

Truck Destroyed By Exhaust Fire

Heat from a pickup exhaust ignited a straw stack and the flames in turn destroyed the pickup last Sunday morning at the Alberta Bowen farm on Ivanhoe.

Fire Chief Ralph Lawrence reported that Clyde Bohannon, who operates the farm, was hauling baled straw from a stack in the field and had backed the truck to the stack preparatory to loading, causing the straw to catch fire.

Firemen were called, but were unable to save the vehicle or the straw.

For the first time in several weeks, a seven-day period elapsed with no calls to put out grass fires in the city or rural district.

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Street Bond Vote May Be Called For Improvements

Nyssa may have a bond election for voters to approve necessary funds for the city's part in a proposed street improvement district that has been under consideration for more than a year, it was decided Tuesday night at the regular monthly council meeting.

Various aspects of the extensive street improvement project were discussed, but no decision reached as to the manner of assessment or the amount of streets to be included. It was decided, however, that in view of state aid for almost all other improvement districts and the fact that the city had borne the cost of intersections, a bond issue would be necessary for intersections and for streets abutting city property.

Ammonia Tank Change

Douglas Bateman, manager of Nyssa Co-op Supply, and a representative of Pacific Supply Co-op appeared at the meeting and assured council changes will be made on a storage tank supplying aqua ammonia. Verbal complaints of unfavorable odors have been made to the city, but no affidavits have been filed. The co-op men stated that a vertical tank with a water filtering system will be installed to replace the temporary horizontal tank. Council accepted the proposal on condition of a letter from the co-op board specifying details of facilities and responsibility.

The group agreed to amend a zoning ordinance to allow existing buildings within a business zone to be remodeled with wood materials. John Quigley, whose home is in the business zone, had requested variance from a fire zone ordinance to construct an addition.

The request of Duane Kressly to locate a trailer house on Signal Service Station property on Main street was disallowed and the city attorney and city manager were instructed to prepare a house trailer ordinance.

It was reported that installation of water mains on North Fifth and Sixth streets has been completed with cleanup work and re-seeding of lawns to be done immediately. Trenches must be filled with gravel and allowed to settle before broken paving can be replaced.

An Amalgamated Sugar Co. proposal to install a fire and burglar alarm system was discussed and it was reported that the Nyssa Volunteer Fire department had rejected a proposal that firemen be given keys for entry to the company grounds. The two systems would have been connected with the fire alarm and police alarm systems.

Myrick Opens Chevron Station

Howard Myrick announced the opening of his Chevron service station this week. The station will be in operation and ready for business this Saturday.

He was formerly employed by Hollingsworth's Implement company for nine years as assistant sales manager. Before that he operated his own radiator shop here. He plans to do radiator work in his station.

Sophomores will be registered Aug. 22 from 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. with evening registration from 7 to 9 for convenience of those unable to report during the day. Freshmen register Aug. 23 from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., Jenkins announced.

Actual sign-up for classes was completed last spring. The present registration is for payment of fees, receiving textbooks, locker assignments and class schedules.
