

State Law Cited For Compulsory School Attendance

With the approach of the new school term, it becomes necessary to remind every person having control of any child between the ages of 7 and 18 years, they are required to send such child to a public full-time school for attendance during the entire school term, Supt. William Leggitt of Malheur county schools advised this week.

Exceptions provided in ORS 339.030 include children attending private or parochial school, children physically unable and duly certified as such by a qualified physician, children legally employed between the ages of 16 and 18 years who are attending a public part-time school not less than five hours per week, children between the ages of 7 and 10 years whose parents live more than three miles by nearest traveled road from some public school, the county superintendent reported.

The latter exemption does not apply if a district provides pupil transportation within the distance specified. Other exemptions include children being taught by parents or private teacher with permission and supervision of the county superintendent and children legally excused by the school board.

Leggitt said this compulsory law will be strictly enforced during the coming school year. Robert Kriner, county juvenile counselor and attendance officer, will check the census of each school district with the enrollment and each child must be legally accounted for.

Failure to comply with the compulsory school law is punishable upon conviction by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than two nor more than 30 days, or both.

From molecules to the ministry is a big jump, but after 22 years as a high school chemistry teacher Paul Ludlow decided to leave the classroom for the pulpit.

Paul Ludlow was born in Bellingham, Wash., Jan. 8, 1906. His family moved to Filer, Ida., when he was an infant. He attended grade school in Filer and high school at McMinnville and Portland.

He received a bachelor of arts degree from Linfield college in 1929. He began his teaching career at Filer. After eight years he moved to Nampa and taught chemistry there for 15 years.

About the time of the atomic bomb attack on Japan he began to do some serious thinking concerning the world and where it was headed. He felt that all of the answers were not to be found in science. It became increasingly clear to him that there was a greater need for social scientists than physical scientists.

During his stay in Nampa he became interested in church work and in 1952 he decided to enter the ministry.

He enrolled at the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, Calif. For three years he attended school, taking courses designed to prepare him for religious work. (Continued on Page 12)

Sales, Spanish Classes for Public Scheduled by Chamber in September

Adult education classes sponsored by the Nyssa Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with the State Vocational Education department and Nyssa schools

will get underway the week of Sept. 9, it was announced this week by Bill Wahlert, chairman of arrangements for the chamber.

One course known as "The Dynamics of Selling" will be offered each Monday evening, beginning Sept. 9. Another known as "Conversational Spanish" will begin Tuesday evening, Sept. 10, and probably will be divided for two weekly classes for beginners and advanced students. Arrangements have been made for a second Spanish class to be held Thursday evenings, beginning Sept. 12. All prospective students will attend the Tuesday meeting where divisions will be made.

Instructing the selling class will be Oscar J. Elliott, Payette, former Nyssa food store manager and now division sales manager for the Idaho Power Co. Elliott has had 25 years experience in the retail and sales business, two years as a teacher and has just completed a full sales training course in the east.

The course has been developed by outstanding educators and is used nationally in schools and colleges. Basic points covered include store management, sales approach, knowing merchandise, stock control, credits, personnel, volume, sales personality, customer needs, public relations and case histories.

Thomas P. Sullivan will be instructor for the Spanish classes with a background of having been graduated from the Inter-American School of Spanish in Coahuila, Mexico, and from St. Johns University, Collegeville, Minn. He has been teaching Spanish for the past four years and is currently an instructor in the Ontario high school.

The course will consist of 24 hours of conversational Spanish, including preparation, meaning and phraseology of the language.

Cost of the courses will be approximately \$8 per person for each of the series including all textbooks.

Persons interested are asked to register with Ralph Lawrence by Friday evening of this week. Although additional students may be accepted Monday and Tuesday evenings, there is a possibility that textbooks might not be available and no reduction in costs can be made, it was emphasized by Wahlert.

Classrooms are being provided by Nyssa schools and will be in the high school building. Starting time of each class is 7 p.m.

Onion Futures Bill Doubtful

Imminent adjournment of Congress makes it doubtful that the U.S. Senate will act on the onion futures bill this session, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger reported in a telegram Monday.

Factory Manager Inspects Nyssa For Possible Site

Representatives of a house trailer manufacturing company in California spent more than two hours in Nyssa Tuesday conferring with Chamber of Commerce and business officials to consider a location for a plant in the lower Snake river valley.

Dan Pocapalia of Long Beach, Calif., president of the firm, his assistant, and Floyd Sperry and Orland Mayer, Boise, representing the Western Idaho-Eastern Oregon Development council, reviewed details compiled during the past three weeks by a special chamber committee composed of Wilton Jackson, president, Leonard Hewett, Ted Morgan and Jed Lewis.

To Locate in Area

It is understood that the firm will definitely build a plant at Boise, Nampa, Caldwell, Nyssa, Ontario or Weiser. Pocapalia told the local group that 150 or more persons would be employed on a 12-month basis to provide a \$50,000 a month payroll and produce \$1,000,000 worth of trailers annually. The Long Beach plant is currently producing \$2,000,000 worth of trailers each year.

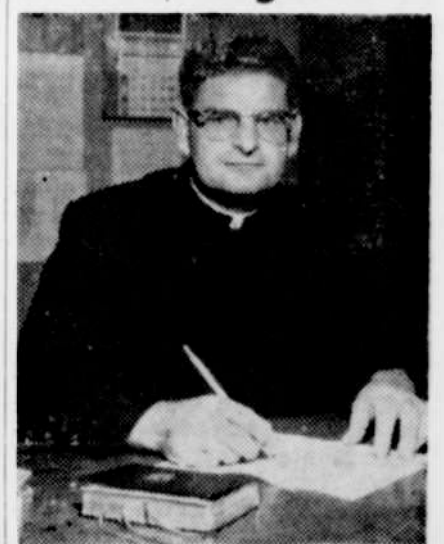
