County Library

Several current titles head the list for hot-weather reading going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 17, at the Malheur county library.

Pearl Buck's new novel, "Letter from Peking," is a story of a wife in Vermont, her half-Chinese husband who has remained in Peking and their son who has just reached manhood.

"Adenauer" by Paul Weymar is the authorized biography of the west German chancellor.

The story of the earth satellite program is told by Arthur Clarke in "The Making of a Moon."

"It's a Big Country" by Ben Lucien Burman describes people and country in diverse regions off the main highways of America, including anecdotes on Missouri river pilots, Ozark beekeepers and Seminole Indians in the Everglades.

"The Small Woman" is the story of Gladys Aylward written by Alan Burgess. She spent seven years as a missionary with mountain people in a remote village of China, was a spy for the Nationalists during the Japanese invasion and led 100 refugee children to safety across the mountains and the Yellow river.

"The Bible for Family Reading" is shorter than standard versions because duplications, detailed descriptions of rituals and genealogies have been placed in summarized notes at the end; it is designed for easier reading and based on the King James version.

"The Last One" by Dion Hen-

erson is a novel of the news business whose characters are a rubble-rousing senator, a statesman, and a \$500-a-week wire service chief, all involved in one way or another in a political conspiracy surrounding a presidential nomination.

"Four Ways of Being Human," an introduction to anthropology by Genevieve Lisitzky, is a study of four primitive tribes and their diversified ways of living.

"A Dance in the Sun" by Dan Jacobsen is a story of unexpected and violent events that overtake two hitchhikers to Cape-town on their stop for a night's lodging.

"All the Kingdoms of the Earth" by Hoke Norris tells the story of two generations of Negro people in Crooked Creek.

"Tecumseh; Vision of Glory" by Glenn Tucker describes the character of the great Indian leader who dominated the American frontier before 1812.

"Military Heritage of America" by Richard and Trevor Dupuy is a military history of our country's wars, strategy and tactics from colonial times to the present.

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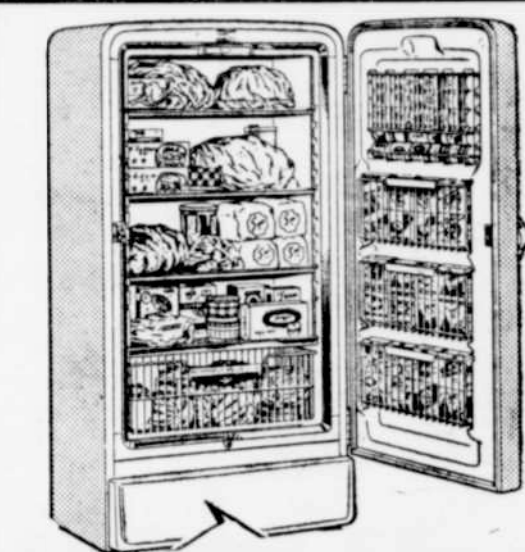
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
