Guernsey Herd Is Classified

Bosch and Hunter, Beautiview Farm, Nyssa, have recently had their Guernsey herd classified for type by L. O. Colebank, Knoxville, Tenn., official classifier for the American Guernsey Cattle club.

A complete analysis of the herd for type was prepared for Bosch and Hunter. This shows that of their 15 cows classified, one was rated excellent, three very good, five desirable and two acceptable.

Results of this work tell the breeder the strong and weak points in the conformation of their herd. By selecting the better cows and breeding them to sires that transmit good conformation, herd type can be improved.

The report of this official classification has been sent to the national office of the American Guernsey Cattle club in Peterborough, N. H., for approval and publication.

Potato Program Announced for Diverted Usage

A federal program of payments for potatoes diverted to livestock feed and starch was made effective Aug. 23 through Sept. 30 for the producing area of Idaho and Malheur county, according to Turner Bond, county extension agent. Verification was received through M. O. Stratford of Idaho Potato Producers association, following joint request by that group with the Malheur Potato Growers association for a diversion program.

Payment is made for diverted potatoes only on those grading U. S. No. 2 and better. The rates have been set at 40 cents per hundredweight for potatoes diverted to livestock feed and 30 cents for manufacture of starch.

Requirements to be met in qualifying for diversion payments are the same as were in effect for the last two years. For livestock feed diversion, this means potatoes must be mutilated by chopping or mashing and that weight, grade and the extent of mutilation must be checked by federal-state inspectors to provide evidence of compliance.

The Ontario ASC office will handle the mechanics of potato diversion, Bond says, as has been the case in past programs. Details of handling diversion potatoes can be obtained from the ASC office as soon as procedures have been worked out, according to Allan Jacobs, ASC secretary.

Onion Handling Regulations Now in Effect

New onion handling regulations became effective Sunday and will continue through June 30, 1958, it was announced by the Idaho Eastern Oregon onion committee which has its headquarters in Parma. Marketing agreements are the result of action of area onion growers and handlers, including those in Malheur County.

Among regulations are restrictions on shippers who cannot handle onions of the yellow or brown varieties unless the onions are no smaller than two inches in diameter, with no more than five percent, by weight, of a size smaller than two inches and unless such onions, other than U. S. No. 2, are packed within certain size ranges.

Mediums are from two to three and one-eighth and large, or jumbo, are from three inches and larger.

Exceptions are that handlers may make one shipment of less than one ton per day without regard to inspection requirements and they may be handled without regard to regulatory, assessment and inspection requirements if they are for export, relief or charity, livestock feed and planting.

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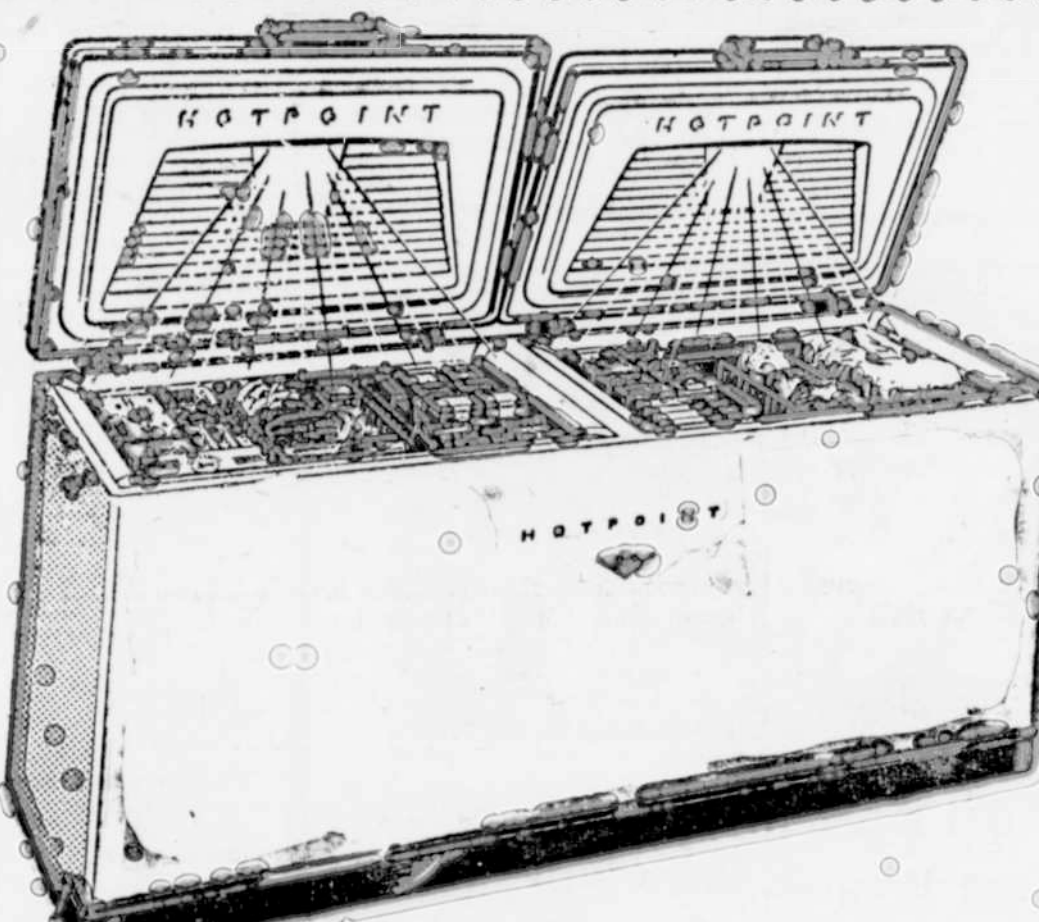
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
