15 Years Ago—Sept. 17, 1942

Ted Morgan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Morgan, has enlisted in the Navy. . . . Dick Osborne, Robert McCurdy and Eldon Sternweis, all employees of the Nyssa branch of the First National Bank of Portland, left this week to join the Navy. . . . Burglars entered the Nyssa grade school building Sunday night and escaped with property valued at \$200. . . . Second Lt. Lloyd A. Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Wilson of Nyssa, was graduated Sept. 12 from the Army Air Force Statistical school at Harvard university.

20 Years Ago—Sept. 16, 1937

Enrollment this school year has increased 20 percent over that of last year, according to Supt. Hollenberg. Two buses were added to serve the district. The bus system is transporting 340 students. . . . With a crew of 45 toppers in the 50-acre onion field, Ira R. Ure, manager of the E. D. Muir & Co. farms, said he expected to harvest about 30,000 sacks of onions. . . . A fire, started from a tractor-driven thresher, burned 1500 bushels of wheat at the Ward Bros. farm 1½ miles southwest of Nyssa.

30 Years Ago—Sept. 16, 1927

Assorted Novels Added to Shelves Of County Library

Assorted novels and two pictorial works are found among the books going into circulation Saturday, Oct. 5, at the Malheur county library.

"Below the Salt" by Thomas Costain begins in a present-day setting, then turns back to recount events in England and Europe that led to the Magna Charta.

"The Gilded Torch" by Iola Fuller is a historical novel about the early expeditions of La Salle in search of the Mississippi river.

"The Running Iron" by Rachel Fish is a story of post-Civil war days and of a man who leaves the South to take up life with his family on the Wyoming frontier.

"The Promoters" by Stephen Longstreet concerns the fight for control of a great southwestern railroad.

"The Door into Summer" is a science-fiction novel by Robert Heinlein. A collection of short stories in this field is the sixth series of "The Best from Fantasy and Science Fiction."

"Air Force" by Martin Caidin is a pictorial history of American power.

"The Great Chain of Life" by Joseph Krutch is a wide-ranging discussion of the animal world.

"Man Against Germs" by Abraham Baron deals with 13 germs and man's means of combatting them and also the struggle of scientific men to find effective weapons against disease.

"Natural History of Birds" by Leonard Wing is a guide to ornithology.

"A Pictorial History of the Negro in America" by Langston Hughes and Milton Meltzer covers the years 1619-1956.

"The Deeds of Dr. Deadeart" is a mystery novel by Joan Fleming.

Other books recently added to the library at Ontario include:

"The Deep Range" is a kind of science fiction novel by Arthur Clarke about a time many years in the future when the earth's population is fed principally from the sea.

"Devil's Brood" by Alfred Dugan is the story of Henry II of England, his sons and Eleanor of Aquitaine.

"In Search of the Golden West" by Earl Pomeroy is an anecdotal history of the tourist in western America from the opening of the transcontinental railroad to the present.

"Advanced Golf" by Cary Mid-dieoff gives golfers the benefit of the things the author has learned in 10 years of professional play.

The traveler will enjoy Herb Caen's "Guide to San Francisco" and "Japan" edited by Dore Og-rezek which is one of the "World in Color" series.

"Standard Handbook of Stamp Collecting" by Richard Cabeen introduces the hobby, gives postal history, unusual uses of stamps (like color and designs), classifications and identification.

"A Teacher Is a Person" by Charles Wilson illustrates by classroom experiences the author's ideas on education including such topics as grading, discipline and teacher-student relationships.

"The Orwell Reader" is a treasury of fiction, essays and reportage by the late author of "1984."

"The Yalu Flows" contains Mir-yok Yi's reminiscences of a Korean childhood in the first two decades of this century.

"Creative Cooking" by Nicholas Roosevelt presents ideas on the art of seasoning, the challenge of the egg, beautiful soup, varied vegetables, etc.

"Electronics Made Easy," published by Popular Mechanics magazine, discusses radio, high fidelity and transistors.

"The Book of Storms" by Eric Sloane graphically depicts cyclonic storms, waterspouts, hurricanes, dust storms, etc., with drawings and photographed paintings.

"The Church in Southeast Asia" by Winburn Thomas concerns the Christian missionary movement in Indonesia, Malaya, Thailand, etc.

"The Borzoi Book of French Folk Tales," selected and edited by Paul Delarue, contains France's best folk stories as countrymen and villagers have told them. . . . Tales of the supernatural, animal tales and humorous tales.

"Holiday Candy and Cookie Cook Book" by Paul DeGros contains recipes, step-by-step instructions and illustrations for both basic and holiday candies and cookies.

Pvt. James Skeen Among Upper Ten

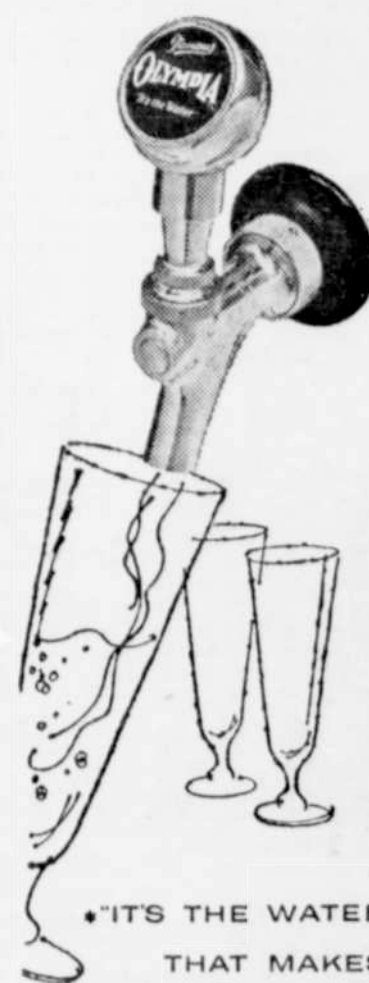

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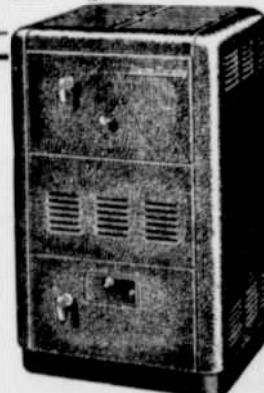
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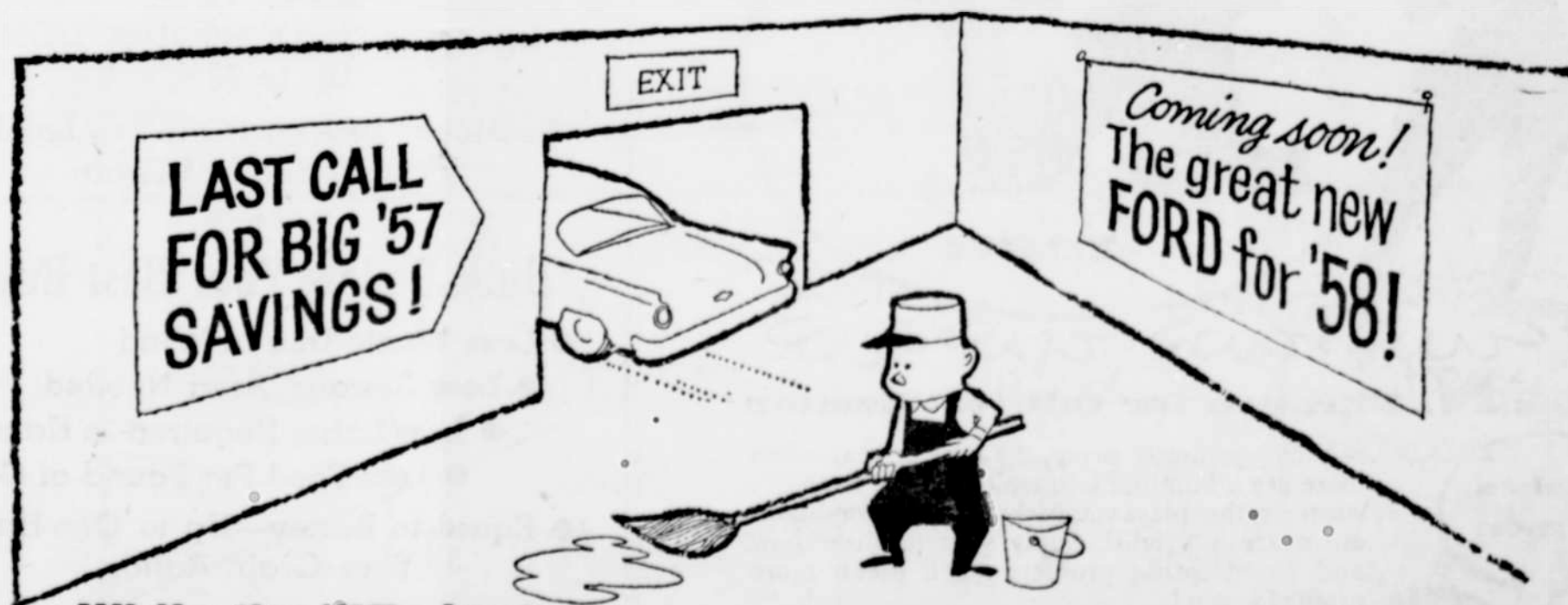
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
