Nyssa Bulldogs Score 42-19 Victory Over John Day in Friday Gridfest

Nyssa again exploited the second quarter for three touchdowns to overrun the John Day Prospects 42-19 and avenge last season's 39-38 setback in their game here Friday night.

Gerald Talbot was high scorer for the Bulldogs, scoring three 6-pointers, one on a 26-yard reverse, the others on passes from Gale Coleman. The latter accounted for one, going over from the 3 in the first quarter. Dennis Savage and Larry Roberts also entered the scoring column with one apiece—each from the 10.

Extra-point honors were well distributed—no man scoring more than one. Roberts, Clark Jaques, Don Walker, John Messick and Glenn Walker each legged it over while Coleman passed to Talbot for another.

John Day Scores Early

The Prospects got off to a fast start by recovering a Bulldog fumble on the Nyssa 31. The home team held for two down and then Gary Fisher passed 18 yards to Ted Talbot who was stopped in his tracks. On the next play, however, Fisher went around end to score the TD. Masonheimer kicked the extra point.

The Bulldogs bounced right back driving 70 yards in 13 plays for a touchdown. They were helped by a 15-yard personal foul

penalty against John Day, but hindered by 20 yards assessed against them. Savage scored this first touchdown, going over from the 10.

After the kickoff, which Ted Talbot returned 21 yards to the 33, the Prospects drove 67 yards in seven plays. Fisher set up the TD with a 28-yard ramble to the 6-inch line. Talbot scored this one, though Masonheimer's kick was low.

Seven Plays to Score

Starting from the 24, the Bulldogs went the distance in only seven plays. Gerald Talbot added 21 yards to the effort and Roberts went over from the 10. He also made the conversion.

Ron Rookstool kicked off to the 13. Nyssa threw Fisher for a loss in two straight plays, so they passed with a third and 16 situation. Roberts intercepted the pass on the 30 but was dropped in his tracks. Five plays later Coleman went over from the 3, with Jaques scoring the extra point.

Nyssa tried an on-side kick on the next play but the Prospects got the ball on their 46-yard line. They were unable to make the necessary 10 yards and the Bulldogs took over on their own 48-yard line.

On the next play Savage bulled his way 19 yards to the 30. From there, with only 5 seconds left, Coleman passed a beauty 25 yards to Talbot who scored for Nyssa just before the gun sounded. Don Walker made the extra point to make the score Nyssa 28, John Day 13.

Bulldogs Score on Reverse

Nyssa kicked to John Day to start the second half. The Pros-

pects kicked after three downs and Nyssa again drove to a TD. They took over on their own 6-yard line and pushed to John Day's 26-yard line in nine plays, from where Talbot scored on a reverse. Coleman passed to Messick for the conversion after two penalties had sent them back to the 12.

The Prospects drove steadily to their last score after the Nyssa kickoff. Ted passed three yards to Haines for the TD. Fisher's conversion kick was low.

The Bulldogs' final touchdown came after Roberts intercepted Wagner's pass on the Prospects' 36. Nyssa scored from there in two plays. Savage bucked 19 yards to the 22 after a 5-yard penalty nullified Messick's touchdown. Coleman passed 22 yards to Talbot for the final TD. Glenn Walker converted.

The game see-sawed back and forth after that.

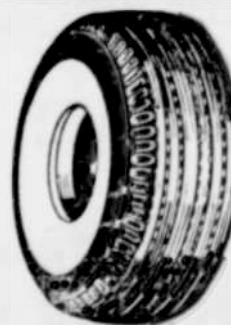
