"History As You Heard It" is a record of day to day events as they happened and as they were reported by commentator Lowell Thomas from 1930 to 1955.

Three books relating to strategic countries of today's world are "Soviet Russia Today; Patterns and Prospects" by John Stipp, which shows for the general reader what led up to the revolution of 1917, the Bolshevik's brand of Marxism and the forces governing Soviet affairs today; "Yugoslavia by Suzanne Normand, describing the countryside, its people and customs, and "Germany, My Host" by John Cole which is an informal, personalized account of post-war East and West Germany.

"Atoms and the Universe" by Gwyn Jones and others is an account of modern views on the structure of matter and the universe.

"Guide to Glamour" by Eleanor King concerns beauty, poise, good grooming, charm and new make-up techniques.

"Air Conditioning Refrigerating Data Book" is a new edition of a work published by the American Society of Refrigerating Engineers and deals with frozen foods, refrigerated warehouse practice and food distribution, industrial application of refrigeration, comfort air conditioning, etc.

"From the Dark Tower" by Georges Simenon is a novel dramatizing the plight of the organization man who, suddenly jolted by a friend's suicide, asks "What price security?"

"The Enemy Below" is a World War II story by Denys Rayner in which opponents in a German U-boat and a British destroyer with equal skill and determination engage in combat.

Chuck Huggins, American Legion Commander of Oregon, of Salem at a no host dinner held at the East Side Cafe held in Ontario Oct. 10, said that the American Legion since its organization after World War I has become one of the great stabilizing forces in the United States.

Huggins spoke at a district American Legion conference attended by 100 veterans and wives from Ontario, Nyssa, Vale and Adrian. 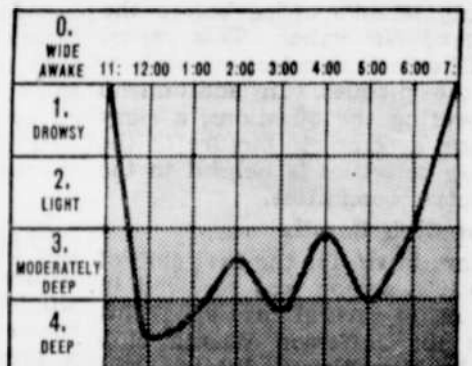

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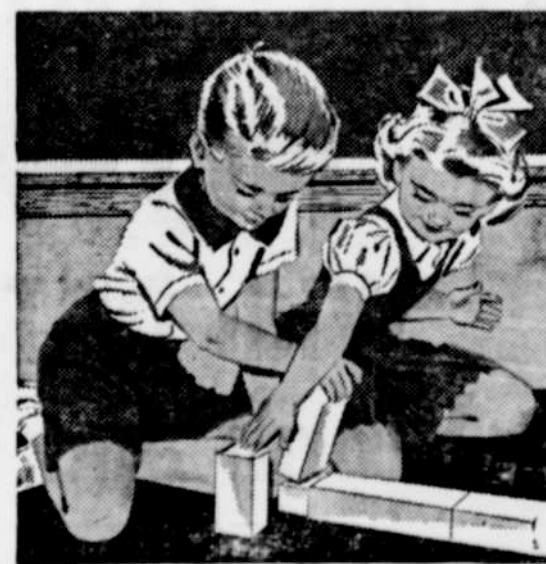
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
