

Variety of Topics Discussed in New Books at Library

A travel book, novels, humorous anecdotes and readable books of information on such topics as housing developments and psychology top the list of books going into circulation Saturday, Oct. 26, at Malheur county library.

"Any Old Place with You" by William Zinsser is described as "the true story of some impractical voyages to implausible places on a number of continents."

"Our Valiant Few" by Van Wyck Mason is a novel of the South's struggle to break the Union naval blockade during the Civil war.

"Life at Happy Knoll" is a story by John Marquand about the country club set.

In the collection of writings, "Man Against Woman," edited by Charles Neider, writers like James Thurber, Dorothy Parker, H. L. Mencken and Ogden Nash offer a variety of wit, opinion and enlightenment on the battle of the sexes.

"The Crack in the Picture Window" by John Keats is a humorous, yet serious report on the housing developments that are growing up on city fringes—what the author calls "identical boxes" in "fresh-air slums we're building around the edges of America's cities... for literally nothing down—other than a simple two percent and a promise to pay, and pay, and pay—until the end of your life."

"Basic Psychology" by Leonard Carmichael is a non-technical introduction to the attitudes, behavior and thoughts of modern man. "Tractors and Crawlers" by Irving Frazee gives design features, operating principles, construction, maintenance and repair details for tractors and crawlers used in agriculture, logging, road building and industry.

Two books of interest to the homemaker are "The New Basic Cook Book" and "Mrs. Homemaker's Forum Encyclopedia of Household Hints."

"Tropical Fish in Your Home" by Herbert Axelrod discusses the aquarium and the fishes for it. "The Cruel Cocks" by Garland

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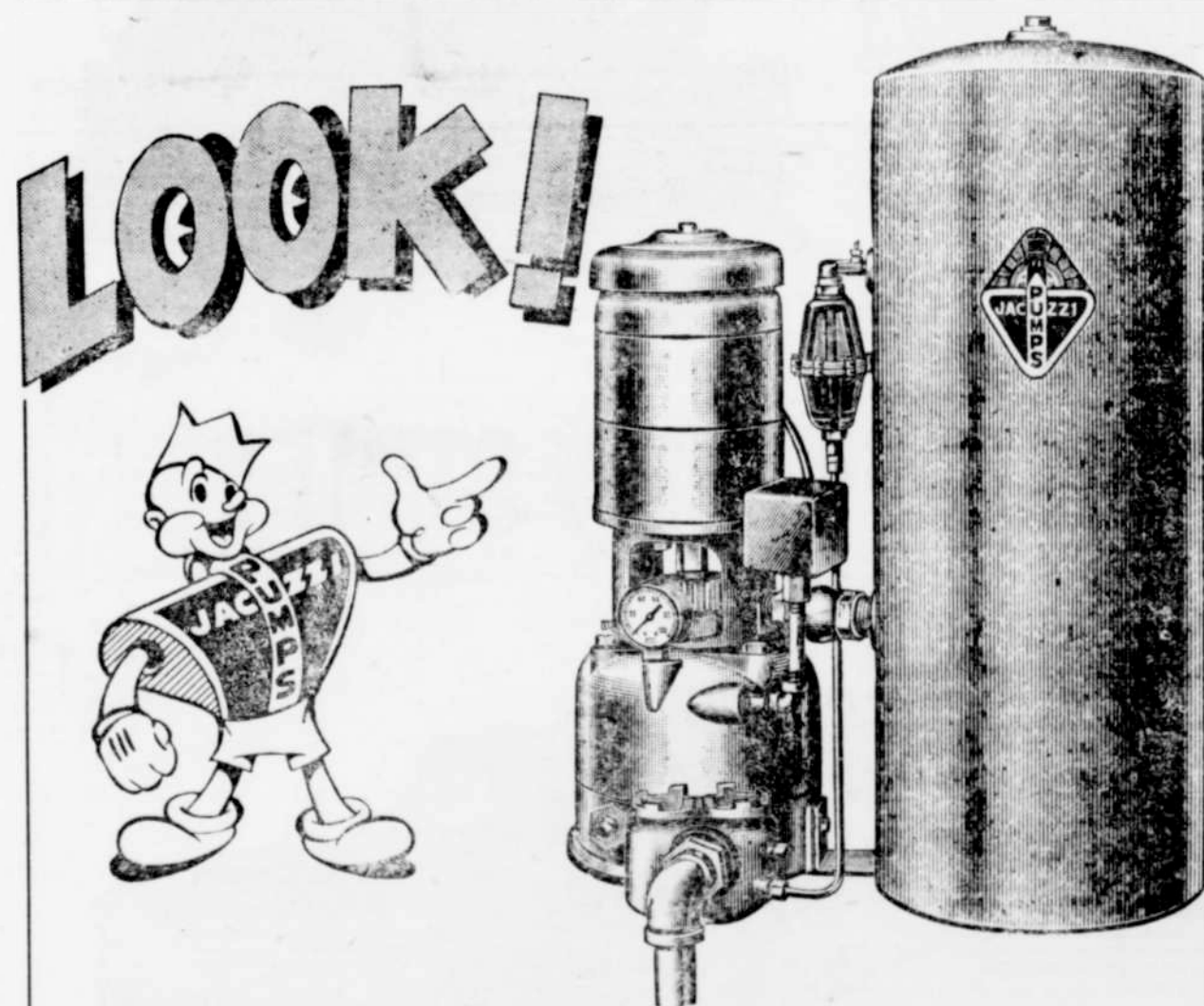
