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$\frac{3}{4}$ cup milk
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted enriched flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups shortening
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup warm (not hot) water
(lukewarm for compressed yeast)

1 package or cake yeast,
active dry or compressed
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted enriched flour
1 tablespoon melted butter
 $\frac{1}{2}$ pound Cheddar cheese, grated

Scald milk; stir in sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, for active dry yeast, lukewarm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm mixture. Add half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl; brush top with shortening. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, about 1 hour or until doubled in bulk. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Divide dough in half. Form each half into a roll about 12 inches long. Cut each roll into 24 equal pieces. Form into balls. In 2 well-greased loaf pans about 9x5x3 inches, place a layer of balls about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch apart. Brush lightly with melted butter. Sprinkle with half the grated cheese. Arrange a second layer of balls on top of first. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Cover. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, about 1 hour or until top of dough is slightly higher than edges of pans. Brush with more butter. Bake in 375° F. (moderate oven) for 20 minutes. Makes 2 loaves.
